We have officially made the halfway point of the contest season. As a Team, our SSB performance fell a bit short from last year, and was cause for some concern. But there were some outstanding efforts that came forward we managed to end up about 6M below FRC's claimed score. There may be a few SSB scores that we don't know, but the 6M deficit is probably reasonably close to the actual number. A few members have chosen to support more regional clubs, which was for several reasons that we will try to address in the upcoming months. And then when CW came around, you all rallied to the cause of the Team, and we have done well here. Our CW score was in excess of 31 Meg greater than last year's CW effort. The net gain will be a 7 - 8 Meg (approximately after UBN assuming the same deduction as last year) improvement over last years total for both modes. Will this be enough? We can only wait and see. We also need to see what FRC has claimed in full for both modes, as well as the dastardly UBN's. We won by a scant 6M last year, time will tell. We improved a little so the results will fall where they may. We ultimately improved our score as a Team, and that is a good thing.

So what went well? Did you have results that were less than desirable? I hope you made some notes and have them ready for the next year, or perhaps the ARRL contests coming up in a few weeks.

There were so many good points to the CQWW contests this year, many improvements and efforts. The efforts made by the Team have been outstanding! There are to many to mention, but as I right this, several come to mind like: W1EBI joining the club in Boxborough and getting on the air for both modes and contributing in excess 1.25M combined, or W1SRG shattering the 1M boundary for the first time in SSB and repeating that same feat in CW. K0TV hustling to get the station on the air and staffed for the first time as a Multi-Op, N3KCJ borrowing

a rig to get on for both modes and making great contributions as a new member. The CT-RI group who although looking to participate as a club in the smaller contests contribute their efforts in CQWW and ARRL to the Team. All of the members who, when mother nature rendered their station inoperable to whatever degree made the effort to get to assist at a multi-op instead of sitting home. I could go on for hours, but suffice to say that to all of you who made the effort to support the Team in one or both modes THANKS to all from the Officers!

Will you be QRV for ARRL DX? It is coming up soon! This is the contest where the world needs to work the US. Have you been practicing your running? The world will want to work us, if you can get on a frequency, even high in the bands, you should be able to get some great runs going in this test. Why not get on a little contest between now and the ARRL DX CW and get a little practice in running. It will improve your score and your abilities, and probably your enjoyment in the contest. We will still be fighting to beat FRC in the ARRL DX contests, and will once again call on each and every one of you folks to get on and support the Team. Are you ready for the challenge? I hope so because the Team needs you!

In the reviews of CQWW however, there is a trend or two that is troubling to me, and I hope to you as well.

When I first was elected to be your president nearly a year ago, one of the first things I did was send a letter to Doug Priest W3CF who was the president on FRC to inquire of their claimed scores for ARRL DX and part of his reply was: *"...we have 190 members and about 140 active....Last time I heard you guys were hovering about 450.....It's like fighting a war of attrition with the Chinese...."* We may have let them off the hook ourselves. We did hover close to 450 for eligible members this year in CQWW, but you know what? Our active participation in CQWW CW was about 150 scores there might be 50 members who supported the multi-ops in that bringing the total to about 200. In CQWW SSB we have seen numbers only slightly larger than that, the same number supporting the multi-ops and about ten more scores in all. We have certainly reduced our participation enough to give FRC the opening they needed. Every president of the YCCC has always pointed out the FRC's tremendous operators, and how they have in a top 50 comparison been able to beat us. Our strength has always been in our depth. We mustn't lose that Team!

We have a large club, and there will always be reasons why some people may or may not get on and support the Team in the contests, but the large drop off we have seen this year worries me a little? Not everyone can participate in every facet of a Club like ours. But I am certainly curious as to why we have had such a drop off in participation. I would love to hear about your opinions, and from this maybe we can improve the YCCC as a whole! I would certainly like to get the story from the horses mouth so to speak, and see if there is a way to get us all excited to get on the air in a contest and compete against the FRC or whomever may come along and show then why the YCCC is the premier contesting club that you have all made it.

Ahoy Maties! I'm writing this as we're getting set to head South in the motorhome for our 11th year on the road since retiring. I do more casual operating from the motorhome than I do when I'm at home, and can be found most mornings between 6 and 8 AM (local time depending on where we are) and around supper time, around 025 on any band. Looking forward to seeing how my stealth antenna does with the latest mod. In case you didn't see it in the latest Antenna Compendium, I load the ladder on the back of my RV using an Icom AH4 tuner near the base of the ladder. It loads on 80 thru 6M and I can change bands with the IC706 in two seconds. My "mod" is the addition of an 8-ft whip at the top of the ladder, which folds down while driving. It's no longer a "stealth antenna" but may get out better. Look for me and say hello this winter! Of course we come home for ARRL CW...then head out again for a second trip.

Got this note from Kurt Pauer, IV3/W6PH (enjoying Christmas in Italy):

"Jack, I want to give you this one before I forget. Whenever I use U-bolts doing antenna work, I buy muffler clamps of the same diameter as the pipe I am clamping. Throw away the U-bolt (they start rusting immediately) and use the saddle with your stainless steel U-bolt. You never have to worry about deforming the aluminum tubing that you are clamping (within reason) as the saddle holds the shape of the tubing. It never loosens!! "

Enjoyed reading the recent thread about elevated radials on the YCCC reflector. Interesting how many members are in the Broadcast Industry or have had experience in AM, FM or TV broadcasting. We have a wide base of expertise in this club, where you can get answers to any technical question you have! Don't be shy...ask and you'll get answers.

In my last column I talked about phasing headphones to make it sound like the sound is in the center of your head (in-phase) or at each ear. I had gotten a Heil headset with a phasing switch, but decided that the headset was no more comfortable than my old Beyers headset, and decided to just refurbish the Beyers with a new headband and earpads. DUES AND MEMBERSHIP STUFF Dues are payable as of the April election meeting, which begins our club "contest year". The YCCC has adopted a multi-tiered membership format as follows: Please note that payment of dues IS NOT a prerequisite for contributing scores to the Club aggregate, but IS for the various YCCC Awards Programs

Full Member - \$20 (Eligible for YCCC awards programs and paper delivery of Club newsletter)

Full Member - \$15 (Eligible for YCCC awards programs and electronic "Ebutt" delivery of Club newsletter)

Family Member - \$0 (Grants full membership to all amateurs residing at one domicile on payment of one member's "Full Member" annual dues and entitlement to one Club Newsletter sent to one domicile or email address. All members of said family are eligible for YCCC awards programs.)

Student Member - \$10 (Grants full membership to students at a reduced level. Eligible for YCCC awards programs and paper or electronic delivery of the Club Newsletter.)

Subscription - \$** (A "friend of YCCC" - not a member but a possible candidate for future membership. Receives club newsletter only in paper or electronic form. Fee basis is \$20 for overseas paper delivery, \$15 for domestic paper delivery and \$10 for electronic "Ebutt" delivery domestically or overseas.)

Club members who move out of club territory and so are not eligible to contribute to club aggregate scores automatically become subscribers. New members who join at the February meeting are credited with dues for the year beginning the following April.
