This is a special time of the year as we repair damage from the harsh winter weather and put in to place, plans to improve the station for the coming contest season. As we all face the low point of the solar flux numbers, we start to look at ways to improve our signals on the low bands. The recent thread of antenna plans, projects have been interesting to read. It makes us all re-think what is working and what is not. I typically do the "blank sheet of paper" approach – listing every known type of antenna that has been designed and look at ways I might be able to use one or more to achieve greater success on a given band. Flotsam & Jetsam

Ahoy Maties!

Spring has sprung and antenna project wx is here at last. With Spring come fleas...flea markets that is. Met Dave, W1CTN at the Southington CT ARA flea market (aka "hamfest" but to me it's a flea market) where Dave mentioned he was looking for some Rohn 25 flat top sections. Shortly after talking to Dave I was met John, KE1IH and learned how he made his own flat top. John cut his conical top off, put rubber plugs in the open ends and taped them up, and then used a rotor shelf for a flat top and a thrust bearing. Another rotor shelf down the tower supports the rotor.

My first antenna project of the season was to string another beverage through the woods before all the leaves were out. It's hard to run a 550 ft wire in a straight line, even without leaves in heavy woodlands. I think I have it straighter than either of my other two beverages this time. What I did was tied a red ribbon on the first oak tree (didn't have yellow), and then another on the next tree the antenna went to. I then sighted down the line to see the two ribbons, and found the next tree in line. I continued with a third ribbon, and then started moving ribbons from the first to the fourth tree, etc as I ran out of ribbon. There were a couple of very long runs between trees where the wire drooped more than I liked. To support the drooping wire I ran a rope under it at right angles, supported by two trees on either side.

Now I need another remote antenna switch box to select receiving antennas. I'll build it and do the switching after the matching transformer, and plan for still more beverages (this was my third). To control the relays, I have to run another cable from the shack. And now for the rest of the story...

When I had my driveway paved a few years back, I had a bundle of cables going overhead in front of the detached garage. At the last minute, when they had already started working on the driveway, I decided to put a conduit underneath so I could run the unsightly cable bundle underground. I ran down to Home Depot, and got some 3 inch schedule 40 PVC with 90 degree elbows for the ends and dug a shallow trench to bury it right in front of the garage. I drilled holes in the bottom to allow water to drain, and put some gravel in the trench under the pipe.

The good news is that the weight of the cars hasn't crushed the pipe, despite a very shallow burial. The bad news is...well, here are some lessons learned:

1. Use at least 4 inch PVC ...schedule 40 is good, and drain holes are still a good idea.

2. Use 45 degree elbows to bring the pipe to the surface at each end. W1RM sloped his last ten feet up at 45 degrees on both ends. In fact when Pete was having his foundation poured, he ran SIX PVC conduits through the foundation into the cellar with plenty of room for future growth. The ends of the unused ones are capped with rubber plugs.

3. Do not tape a bundle of cables together. When I ran a "fish tape" through my pipe, I got it snagged on tape, and thought I would never retrieve the fish tape.

4. Run one or two messengers through the conduit to pull future cable, but do not use rope! My two ropes rotted out...or else mice gnawed through them. Use wire of some kind.

5. Seal the ends with duct seal...available from electrical suppliers or Home Depot. KE1IH puts the stuff in a plastic bag like a baggie, and stuffs it into the end around the cables. It can still be molded to fit but can easily be removed.

Want an inexpensive, multi band vertical to use on a second radio? Take a look at the Hustler 5BTV advertised by DX Engineering for \$140. Saw one at G4BUE when we visited Chris in Florida and it looked like it was nicely built. Put it far enough away from your other antennas and you may not need much in the way of filters.

I recently ran across some old radio history when cleaning out a corner of my cellar. The photo shows an antique resistor. The color code was read in the order "Body, end, dot", so the 2 watt resistor shown is 40K ohms. I know that some of you have never seen a resistor like this...heck, my grandkids never saw a dial telephone!

YCCC Regular Meeting April 9, 2005 Boxborough, MA

The April meeting was called to order by president Jim McCobb WILLU at 1:13pm at the Holiday Inn Boxborough Woods in Boxborough, MA. After the usual round of verbal self-spotting by the above-average crowd of 70 attendees, Jim called on four prospective new members, who introduced themselves prior to being put forth for election to the club. In the time-honored tradition, the following were voted in by acclamation as the newest members of YCCC:

Ann WA1S announced that she will be one of the K7C DXpedition team heading for Kure Island for an 18-day operation this coming September.

Craig K1QX announced the availability of 60 tickets for the Dayton HAMvention. Contact Craig directly at Radioware (www.radio-ware.com).

Chuck W1HIS gave an update on interaction with the "HAMsters" of the Winn Brook School in Belmont, MA, and his great experience teaching Morse code to a group of enthusiastic first-graders who are very inquisitive about geography, planetary science and ham radio. Several YCCC members are also working with the teacher, Donna LaRoche KB1LWY

(http://www.belmont.k12.ma.us/class_pages/laroche/ham_radio/), by donating equipment for the classroom station. Chuck urged YCCC to donate proceeds from the annual raffle earmarked for assisting a school involved in using ham radio in the classroom to the HAMsters.

George W1EBI gave the secretary's report. The current active roster, using the definition of "active" member per the April 1 amendment to the Constitution and Bylaws, lists 326 members (311 full voting members) with dues either current (to March 31, 2006) or not more than one year in arrears.

Ed K1EP gave the treasurer's report. The current treasury balance is approximately \$12,000, with about half that amount in 6-month and 12-month CD's.

Both the secretary's and treasurer's report were accepted by vote.

Mill K1IB presented the results of the membership survey that he and Ted KT1V developed and conducted via email earlier in the year. The survey addressed whether YCCC should change its focus and/or goals, and attempted to (1)

measure member attitudes about the club, (2) gauge member interest in new YCCC objectives and policies, and (3) relate the previous item to various member characteristics. Out of 440 survey recipients, there were 225 responses, a surprisingly high response rate. The members who responded characterized themselves as either "Big Guns" (12%), "Medium Guns" (33%), or "Little Pistols" (47%), with approximately 8% presently out of ammunition. Mill agreed to place the survey results on the website.

The keynote presentation followed, with Jim introducing founding member and first president of YCCC, Jeff Briggs K1ZM/VY2ZM. Jeff's principal subject was WRTC 2006 in Brazil (<http://www.wrtc2006.com/html/web/en/home.asp>), for which he is a North America representative. Jeff pointed out the close ties between YCCC and WRTC, starting with the first WRTC in Seattle in 1990, won by our own team of K1AR and K1DG. Since then, WRTC—the World Radiosport Team Championship—has become the de facto "Olympics" of ham radio. WRTC 2006 is expected to field 52 competing teams, plus more special sponsor teams. Jeff candidly admitted he was requesting YCCC participation in helping fund the huge expense of WRTC 2006, pointing out that WRTC 2002 in Finland cost upwards of \$200,000. Jim WILLU moved to a vote on Jeff's request for a \$1,000 donation in 2005 with the potential of a similar contribution in 2006, provided private contributions from YCCC members total \$1,000 or more. The motion passed. Private contributions will be handled by NCDXF (<http://ncdxf.org/index.html>).

Jeff is better known as one of the all-time super-stations on Top Band, both from K1ZM and his station in PEI, VY2ZM. Jeff talked about the zoning issues in various locations he had originally considered for his 160-meter station, the considerations—including luck—that wound up bringing him to the PEI site, and the advantages (location!) and disadvantages (weather, including unspeakable winters and winds five times more robust than what we experience in New England) of VY2. Jeff described the VY2ZM antenna farm, including his own designs of beefed-up Cushcraft Yagis and the array of verticals for Top Band, basically pairs of ¼-wave verticals separated by 5/8-wave and fed in-phase for, according to Jeff, >5dB broadside gain with "squeezed" lobes. He played some tape recordings of CQ160 2002 from PEI as well as a tape made in JA of Jeff calling CQ at PEI sunrise with two different antenna orientation patterns. Suffice to say that VY2ZM running on 160 sounds a bit like 40 meters wide open to EU at a cycle peak in New England!

Mark KF1V summarized the 2005 ARRL DX CW results from 3830, showing that based on claimed scores (not submitted logs!), YCCC had edged out FRC by 182Meg to 178Meg points. Mark announced that 104 YCCC'ers had worked both sides of ARRL DX, both CW and Phone. Those members were eligible for the "Officers' Challenge"

award, and the winner drawn was Mark Johnsen NB1U, who took home the \$200 gift card from HRO.

Next on the agenda was the annual election of club officers. Jim WILLU stated that we had the now-required superquorum of 15% of voting members in attendance, and the election could proceed. The current officers proposed a slate of candidates consisting of K1RX for president, N1IK for vice president, W1EBI (incumbent) for secretary, K1EP (incumbent) for treasurer, and K1NQ (incumbent) for activities manager. Jim also added Bob W1QA as a second nominee for vice president in Bob's absence. The two "new" candidates made brief personal presentations—Brian N1IK, a YCCC member for two years with one year of serious contesting, and Mark K1RX, a founding member of YCCC in 1977 and its former activities manager 1979-80. Jim then called for a vote on the four uncontested positions, and the four candidates for president, secretary, treasurer and activities manager carried by acclamation. In the vote for vice president, N1IK was the victor by majority vote. The new officer corps for YCCC for the 2005-2006 club year are:

The two departing officers, president Jim McCobb WILLU and vice president Mark Olsen KF1V offered their farewell comments and received a well-earned ovation from the attendees.

Following the election was the annual raffle, for which 182 tickets were sold for a total of \$4,550. The club spent a total of \$2,900 to purchase two prizes, the Array Solutions Six-Pak, and the ICOM IC-756 Pro III, leaving a balance of \$1,650 as a YCCC contribution to the ARRL Foundation for scholarships and to assist a deserving school in its ham radio related activities. 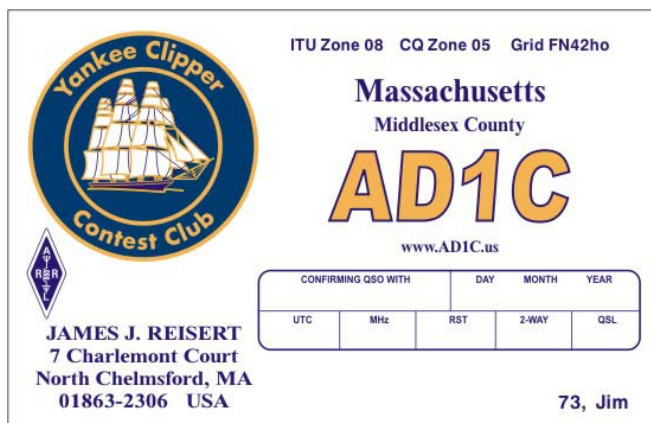

K1TTT is also available for the June VHF Contest. Nothing fancy, but did get a certificate for the section as limited multi-op running Single-Op Assisted in 2004.

Normally use a TS-2000 barefoot, but can hook up a second TS-2000 SO2R operation if necessary.

Antennas are a single Yagis at 150' for 6M (possible broken), 2M, and 70cm and a single 6M Yagi at 60'.
