# Captain's Cabin

By the time you read this CQWW 2012 will be in the books. (There might still be time to get those CW logs in – don't forget – only 5 days)! At the time of writing, things are looking good for YCCC, as we have a great claimed score from the phone weekend. Compared to last year, we had much better conditions – both at ground level and in the ionosphere! 10 meters delivered on it's promise with such great rates that it distracted many operations away from higher multiplier counts. This year the bad weather waited until after the contest to hit us - probably over half of the logs were submitted by the time Hurricane Sandy blew in on Monday. We lost power in Andover, Ma. for only a few hours, and only one wire antenna came down. I'm sure Sandy's impact was much greater on the stations to our south. Despite the competitive juices, we wish them a quick recovery, as we don't want to win by default.

I experienced an all-time first in the SSB weekend: About an hour before the end of the contest, I received an *email* complaining I was on a net frequency! I guess they thought that while I was running Europe on 40 meters, I would also be checking by inbox! Of course, I had made the courtesy 'QRZed-is-this-frequency-in-use?' call before firing up the F1 key. The noise level, with QRM, was probably 20 over. So I guess it's questionable as to whether I should be expected to hear a response off the back of my beam from a 100 watt station in the Midwest. If there had been no contest, and no one else on frequency, I might have expected to be able to hear signals down to the noise floor. But due to the actual conditions of the moment, the threshold of detection was probably well over S9. The whole concept of frequency use being arbitrated by first-come-first-served seems to depend on reciprocity of communication, which as we now recognize, may not always hold true, if noise levels (QRN and QRM) are different at either end of the loop.

A major contest weekend never seems to pass without some sort of frequency conflict. I'm not talking about the usual short-lived exchanges with fellow contesters. We usually recognize each other's callsigns, and make a quick decision to fight or flee – and the decision is usually dictated by rate. However, there now seems to be an obligatory unpleasant exchange with some disgruntled hams who claim to have been using the frequency continuously since a week ago Thursday. Personally, it puts me in a quandary as to the legitimacy of the claim. This doubt is further deepened when the hams making a claim on the frequency resort to intentional QRM and foul language. I strongly suspect that major contests bring out the crackpots among the contest-hating crowd for their venting of distaste for contesting. The last thing I want to do is cause someone else discomfort – but in truth, did these folks just get their license last week? Don't they know the contests fire up during the last weekends of October and November? What is the appropriate time constant for sharing of the ham bands? Out of 8,760 hours in each year, I use the bands less than 200 hours total annually. This amounts to less than 32 minutes per day! I just pile it all up into 4 weekends, along with 8000 other stations, and that seems to be a problem for some folks. Oh well, I'll get off my soapbox now... (I do feel better though)!

On the other hand, there's no doubt that major contests are disruptive to the usual weekend activities on the bands. Consider how difficult it is for us, with our highly capable antennas and maximum legal power, to find anything resembling a clear frequency on a major contest weekend. Folks who are used to being able to hold a round table or net with 100 watt exciters and dipoles are going to be disappointed when they tune to their usual frequency and find several very loud stations occupying it. It just seems impractical to me that the usual gentleman's approach to finding a frequency would be workable under major contest conditions. The best advice we can give them is to plan ahead – know when the contests are going to occur (especially on phone) and move their nets to WARC bands for those times.

To fulfill part of my mission as an amateur, I volunteer for communications support and traffic control for the annual Thanksgiving road race in town. Every year it gets published in the papers and appears in the TV news. Literally 10 thousand runners show up to run a 5K or 5 mile race around the downtown section. Of course, the police shut down traffic along the route. It never ceases to amaze me how citizens show up insisting that they be allowed to drive through the route. These folks have lived in town for years – don't they know yet that the roads will be closed for alternate use for a few hours on Thanksgiving morning? I guess it all boils down to communications, planning, and acceptance of others using a limited resource.

We're halfway through the 2012-2013 Contest season, with ARRL DX contests coming up in February and March. We're planning another Contest University to provide a tune-up for these important battles! Take advantage of the occasional warm day to do some light antenna maintenance, and here's hoping that someone was good to you this gift-giving season!

Arthur W. Holmes, 74, of Mendon, passed away at the University of Massachusetts Memorial Medical Center in Worcester on Friday, Oct. 5, 2012. He was the loving husband of Catherine (Murphy) Holmes, with whom he was married for 53 years. Mr. Holmes was born in Natick, a son of the late Arthur W. and Nellie (Reid) Holmes, and had lived in Mendon for 25 years. A graduate of Northeastern University, where he was in ROTC, he served briefly on active duty with the Army in Fort Monmouth, NJ. He worked in engineering management at IBM from 1960 to 1986 and then at Data General until retiring in 1991. While at IBM in Hudson Valley, NY in the 1970s, he developed the computer micro-chip. He was an avid ham radio operator W1RZF since he was a teenager, as was his father, and whose call he adopted. He was a member of ARRL and many other ham radio associations. Very active in Mendon town government, he had served on the Board of Selectmen, Finance Committee, Nipmuc School Building Committee, and as Town Moderator. He was also active in the United Parish of Upton and enjoyed playing bridge at the Mendon Senior Center. He was the loving father of Thomas M. Holmes and his wife Paula of Sturbridge, Susan M. Kaufman and her husband John of Columbus, OH, and Nancy A. Severs and her husband Sheldon and his sons Harris and Spencer of Woodstock, CT. He also leaves one brother, John G. Holmes of Worcester, and a sister, Mary Belanger and her husband Fred of Paxton. He was also the brother of the late Thomas Holmes of CA. He will be very missed by his animals, dog Mayzie, cat Patches, and grandpup 'Boo.' #### Rod Newkirk, W9BRD (SK)

Former QST "How's DX?" Conductor

Rod Newkirk, W9BRD/VA3ZBB, of Ottawa, Ontario, Canada -- who penned the *QST* column "How's DX?" from 1947-1978 -- passed away on Monday, November 19 after a long illness. Newkirk was credited with coining the term "Elmer," as well as for his humorous take on DX in his column, especially with limericks in his DX Hoggery and Poetry Depreciation Society and the accompanying cartoons of Jeeves by Phil "Gil" Gildersleeve, W1CJD (SK).

The term "Elmer" -- meaning someone who provides personal guidance and assistance to would-be hams -- first appeared in QST in Newkirk's March 1971 "How's DX?" column, where he wrote that "[t]oo frequently one hears a sad story in this little nutshell: 'Oh, I almost got a ticket, too, but Elmer, W9XYZ, moved away and I kind of lost interest.' Sure, the guy could have burned through on his own, maybe, but he, like others, wound up an almost-ham. No more Elmer. We need those Elmers. All the Elmers, including the ham who took the most time and trouble to give you a push toward your license, are the birds who keep this great game young and fresh." Newkirk was probably not trying to coin a term at the time, but the name stuck, becoming a general term for the mentors Newkirk called "the unsung fathers of ham radio."

First licensed in 1937 as W9BRD at 14, Newkirk was involved with radio all his life. After graduating from high school, he became a civilian radio operator in Washington, DC with station WAR; when World War II broke out, he joined the US Army as a member of the Army Signal Corps where he served in Florida, Papua-New Guinea and the Philippines. He remembered these times in his first *QST* article, "Christmas, 1944," which recounted a "heart-warming yarn involving the combination of the Amateur and the Christmas Spirit in far-off Hollandia."

After a stint as a radio operator with the Illinois State Police, Newkirk moved to Connecticut in 1947 where he worked at ARRL Headquarters as a W1AW Station Operator with a new call sign, W1VMW. It was while Newkirk was in Newington that then-ARRL Communications Manager Ed Handy, W1BDI, asked Newkirk to take over the "How's DX?" from Byron Goodman, W1JPE. A few years later, Newkirk returned to his home state of Illinois to go to college. While in Illinois, he regained his W9BRD call sign and resumed his job with the Illinois State Police. He continued to write "How's DX?" from Illinois. Newkirk's last "How's DX?" column was published in February 1978. Newkirk retired from the State Police in 1986. In 1984, he was inducted into the CQ DX Hall of Fame as its 23th member, and in 2002, he was the 87th inductee into the CQ Hall of Fame.

Newkirk was a former member of the ARRL and a member of the Radio Amateurs of Canada, the Ottawa Valley Mobile Radio Club, FISTS, the Morse Telegraph Club and the Quarter Century Wireless Association and QCWA Chapter 70. In May 2007, he was presented with the QCWA "70 Years Licensed" Golden Certificate and lapel pin, and in May 2010, with the QCWA Century Certificate.



**Family Member** - \$0 (Grants full membership to all amateurs residing at one domicile on payment of one member's "Full Member" annual dues and entitlement to one Club Newsletter sent to one domicile or email address. All members of said family are eligible for YCCC awards programs.)

**Student Member** - \$10 (Grants full membership to students at a reduced level. Eligible for YCCC awards programs and paper or electronic delivery of the Club Newsletter.)

**Subscription** - \$\*\* (A "friend of YCCC" - not a member but a possible candidate for future membership. Receives club newsletter only in paper or electronic form. Fee basis is \$20 for overseas paper delivery, \$15 for domestic paper delivery and \$10 for electronic "Ebutt" delivery domestically or overseas.)

Club members who move out of club territory and so are not eligible to contribute to club aggregate scores automatically become subscribers.
