So I strongly recommend giving CW contesting a serious try. It is truly a fun experience! Small scores roll up to big numbers and we can not win unless we have scores (large and small) from all of the membership. At the December 7 meeting, the plan is to have a DXpedition presentation (we had a few this year!) and Randy, K5ZD, recent inductee of the Contesting Hall of Fame present an important talk on the theme of ethics in contesting – it is a don't miss meeting! Ahoy Maties!

Hope everyone had fun in this fall's contest season. I'm writing this on Nov 22, and just came in the house after working what might have been the loudest JA signal I ever heard from my car. I hope that was a sign of good condx to come for CQWW CW.

This one is long overdue...sorry Bob, but I had misfiled it.

W1QA writes:

The XYL and I decided to take a vacation to Southeast Asia over the Christmas and New Year's holiday visiting Thailand, Malaysia and Singapore. Whilst in Bangkok we were very fortunate to meet up with Champ E21EIC and his YL for a couple of days. Although we had enjoyed a few days exploring Bangkok and the surrounding area on our own there's nothing like the perspective and assistance from a local and the time we spent with Champ and his YL was very memorable. Some of you may remember Champ from his visit in 2007 to both New England as well as Dayton (I missed him because I was in SM/OZ/PA-land).

I took Champ up on his offer to secure a Thai license. The process was fairly involved, which included joining the Thai equivalent of the ARRL who subsequently had to issue a letter on my behalf to the licensing authority. A lifetime membership was something on the order of only US \$60.00! Foreigners are issued calls starting with HS0Zxx and the last two letters are of a sequential nature. Although I did not get the ticket whilst there it did finally come through: HS0ZIF and it quite impressive - almost like a driver's license and including a colour picture!

We also visited with E21YDP and his wife. And I was privileged to be able to operate with the King's special event call HS80A in commemoration of his 80th birthday (on 5 Dec 2007). I was surprised to learn that he was actually born in Cambridge MA! I didn't operate HS80A very long - I'm not the kind of person you want in the chair for that kind of a pile-up! Champ E21EIC on the other hand seemed to breeze right through the callers - we're hoping that if he has the opportunity to return to W1-land we'll get him in the seat at NC1I.

We were in Kuala Lumpur for New Year's Eve and stayed in the Trader's Hotel which is adjacent to the park where the Petronas Towers are. That night we were in the club lounge on the 34th floor for the 10+ minute fireworks display. They were lighting off the pyrotechnics directly below our building in the park - it was like being in the middle of the fireworks! You can't imagine what it felt like leaning against the glass windows and feeling the percussion of the explosions all around us. Made for great photos with the Petronas Towers in the background.

Doug Grant, K1DG sent this ..."I have been adding a lot of coax relays to the antenna switching system at my island QTH lately, and 12V coax relays are hard to find (and expensive when they appear). However, 24 and 28V DC (and 110VAC) relays are more available and cheaper. But I don't want to add another power supply (and a spare since there's no place to get a replacement or spare parts on the island).

The 24/28/110V relays will all usually hold in at 12V but need some extra voltage to pull in initially. There are various circuits to allow 12V systems to use these relays, and while they are pretty simple, building them takes time and/or is messy. I found a convenient circuit in kit form (small PCB, couple of relays, diodes, caps) on the Down East Microwave web site for \$10. Reduces construction time from an hour if you build your own discrete version to a few minutes using the kit. I also like the fact that it uses relays instead of transistors, since I end up replacing a lot of switching transistors after nearby lightning strikes each summer. Model RVD-1 at downeastmicrowave.com"

Doug also passed along another good tip. After diagnosing a problem that developed in his wire 4 square array, he found that the conductor inside the insulated flexweave wire he used had opened under stress in two of the four verticals! (BJ uses 10ga THHN for all wire antennas excluding beverages with no breakage problems).

At the Wallingford hamfest Pete, W1RM pointed out a neat gadget for tightening a wire antenna rope, with a quick release mechanism. BJ (Barnacle Jack) has since noticed they are available at Home Depot and hardware stores everywhere, meant for clotheslines. I did get one...for the clothesline! I also saw another device in a hardware store completely different but for the same purpose called a line tightener and located near clothesline rope. Both varieties sell for about \$5.

Dave Jordan has come up with another neat club project he calls "Interface 12" Here is Dave's description:

A 4-port transistor switch allows 6 or 12 Input/Output to drive or translate voltage or ground switched devices. One application as an example of the utility of this project is translating a +12V Band decoder or KK1L 2x6 Switch output to drive a ground switched ICE 6 band TX filter. You can configure all 12 ports to translate just 1 state or configure 2-6 ports to switch +voltage

and ground. Each port is designed to sink 200mA. Drive antennas switches, relays, filters etc. \$8 (inc. shipping) for PCB. Parts are available from Mouser for ~\$11. The latest antenna project at W1WEF has been an improved radial hookup scheme for the 160 inv L and 80M 4 square. Since the antennas are in the woods, and radials have been added over many years, they never looked like the neat sketches you see in books with neatly spaced wires every 10 degrees. I never was happy with my feedpoint arrangements, but at least what I'm doing now is aesthetically nicer...whether it works better or not! In the accompanying photos are shown one of the 4 square feed arrangements I started with. I used a 4x4PT post sticking out of the ground 3 or 4 feet, the idea being to keep the feedpoint above the snow. To avoid tripping over radials sloping downward from the feedpoint, I dressed them down the 4x4, then radially on the ground. I consulted antenna guru Joe Reisert, W1JR and his feeling was that the vertical portion was probably acting more like part of the vertical antenna than a radial...(or interacting with the vertical... BJ). Joe's experience has been that snow at the feedpoint had little effect on his verticals, so I decided to cut the 4x4's closer to the ground, and attach radials as shown in the second photo.

I bought heavy gage 9-inch aluminum cake pans with an encapsulated steel rim at Wal-Mart for \$9. (I since noticed stainless mixing bowls and aluminum pot covers that might have worked out just as well). The radials are attached with stainless sheet metal screws. For the 4 square verticals fed with 70 ohm 1/4 wave coax, the feedline connector on the side of the pan connects directly to the SO239 on top for the antenna.







On my 160 Inv L I use a 1.7:1 un-un that mounts on top of the antenna connector, as described by K1VV in a Butt article a few years back. If I ever get around to it, I'd like to experiment with the matching scheme described in the latest NCJ (Vol 36, no 6) by WX0B which simply uses a shunt inductor at the feedpoint.

Every once in a while I have a member ask me how to get on the YCCC reflector, or how to submit contest scores to the club scorekeeper. Both questions are answered on the Resources page (the last page) of every Scuttlebutt. Note that you must also submit your score to the contest sponsor, and be sure to spell out Yankee Clipper Contest Club on your submission.

2008 ARRL 160 Meter Contest

Don't forget the ARRL 160 Meter contest this coming weekend. Period: Starts 2200 UTC Friday, ends 1600 UTC Sunday (December 5 - December 7, 2008). Forty-two hour period with no time limitation.!

W/VE amateurs exchange information with amateurs worldwide on the 160-meter band CW only. DX-to-DX QSOs do not count for contest credit.

Stations located in overseas and non-contiguous U.S. Territories may be worked by DX stations. (Alaska KL7, the Caribbean US possessions KP1-KP5, and all of the Pacific Ocean territories KH0-KH9, including Hawaii KH6) These stations can work BOTH domestic stations (US and VE) as well as DX stations around the world.Don't forget to check your software to make sure that it accept these QSOs.

Full Member - \$20 (\$35/2 yr) (Eligible for YCCC awards programs and paper delivery of Club newsletter)

Full Member - \$15 (\$25/2 yr) (Eligible for YCCC awards programs and electronic "Ebutt" delivery of Club newsletter)

Family Member - \$0 (Grants full membership to all amateurs residing at one domicile on payment of one member's "Full Member" annual dues and entitlement to one Club Newsletter sent to one domicile or email address. All members of said family are eligible for YCCC awards programs.)

Student Member - \$10 (Grants full membership to students at a reduced level. Eligible for YCCC awards programs and paper or electronic delivery of the Club Newsletter.)

Subscription - \$** (A "friend of YCCC" - not a member but a possible candidate for future membership. Receives club newsletter only in paper or electronic form. Fee basis is \$20 for overseas paper delivery, \$15 for domestic paper delivery and \$10 for electronic "Ebutt" delivery domestically or overseas.)

Club members who move out of club territory and so are not eligible to contribute to club aggregate scores automatically become subscribers. New members who join at the February meeting are credited with dues for the year beginning the following April.
