

YCCC Regular Meeting February 1, 2004 Milford, CT

The regular February meeting convened at the Howard Johnson Hotel in Milford, CT, with 37 attendees. N1XS called the meeting to order at 12:17pm. Chris introduced five prospective new members plus the guest speaker, Scott Robbins W4PA, Sales & Marketing Manager of Ten-Tec, who drove up from Tennessee for his presentation on the hot new Orion. Attendees individually introduced themselves along with a summary of their participation in CQWW and plans for kicking butt in the forthcoming ARRL DX contests.

Each of the five prospective new members introduced themselves: Peter Freiler W1AIR, Joe Wonoski N1KHB, Marty Bowen W1MJB, Ed Kalin K1RT, and Alec Berman W2JU. All five were welcomed into YCCC by unanimous vote.

YCCC was awarded a certificate by the ARRL in recognition of the club's financial contribution to the League's defense of amateur frequencies against the threat of BPL.

K1EP gave the Treasurer's Report. FY2003 expenses exceeded income by \$765. Ed proposed a balanced budget for FY2004 (April 1, 2004 to March 31, 2005) based on estimated income and expenses of \$5,000.

Chris then turned the meeting over to Scott W4PA for his presentation and demo of the new Ten-Tec Orion transceiver. Scott, formerly a member of YCCC as well as FRC when he was still a New Jersey resident, is a co-founder and current president of the Tennessee Contest Group (TCG). Obviously an avid contester, Scott spent the night prior to the Milford meeting making 341 QSO's in the CW Sprint from NT1Y's station in VT, but looked none the worse for wear!

Founded in 1968 by now-98-year-old Al Kahn, founder of the former Electro-Voice Co., Ten-Tec has grown from seven employees and 10,000 sq. ft. to 100 employees and a 40,000 sq. ft. facility in Sevierville, TN. Ten-Tec is well known in the ham radio industry as an innovator, and the Orion is clearly an innovative leap. Why Orion? Scott said the design, pure and simple, was driven by the needs of serious contesters. The overall #1 design criterion was unexcelled receiver performance. Orion evolved from the Omni family of ham band transceivers with their strong filtering and selectivity. Also, ergonomics was a critical element, producing large knobs and buttons, and an easy-to-read display. Key controls were placed within 2-1/2 inches of the main radio knob. Scott described a unique Orion feature, "panoramic stereo" reception and its use in contesting to enhance separation of multiple signals. Scott summarized the key features of the Orion, then addressed questions from the group, including Ten-Tec's decision to limit Orion to 30MHz

and the strategy for building a "soft" radio that is upgradeable via firmware releases downloadable from the Ten-Tec website.

After a break, Chris reminded all that FRC kicked our butts in CQWW SSB with a margin in claimed scores of around 15M, but we crushed them by 68M in CW. FRC also beat us in ARRL SSB in 2002, so the gloves are off and all were urged to get on for Phone if only for a short time here and there to add some points to the YCCC aggregate.

Ed K1EP gave a presentation on "The Raffle." The club has purchased a brand new Ten-Tec Orion with auto-tuner, along with a number of other cool prizes, to be raffled off at the April meeting, subject to minimum sales of 250 tickets. In addition to increasing meeting attendance in April (although you do NOT have to be present to win the Orion or other major prizes—see accompanying article elsewhere in Scuttlebutt) and encouraging new members to join (non-YCCC members pay \$30 per ticket vs. \$25 for members), the club will create a fund to DXpedition participation by a young or newly-licensed ham and will apply 50% of the raffle income to funding college scholarships in an effort to encourage new and young ham interest in contesting. Nominations for deserving scholarship recipients are open now, and winners will be announced in August.

Back to the Orion demo. Scott continued with a detailed discussion of the programmable AGC feature and how it is used in weak signal DXing and major contest work for improving SNR and bringing weak signals up out of the noise. A few attendees fortunate enough to already have new Orions offered their own experiences in using the radio on the air. Eric K3NA orchestrated a club quantity discount deal enabling 25 YCCC members to purchase new Orions at a total savings of over \$8,000. This should raise the club's KB quotient substantially for the next contest season!

Before bringing the meeting to a close, Chris announced that the next meeting is the annual elections meeting, scheduled for Saturday, April 3, at Worcester State College (Ed Note: Meeting location changed to Worcester Holiday Inn. See announcement in this issue). Subject to minimum ticket sales, the raffle drawing will also be on the April 3 agenda. The meeting was adjourned at 3:00pm, followed by much up close and personal inspection of the Orion and Q&A with W4PA.

Flotsam & Jetsam

Ahoy Maties! I'm saying this from aboard the second largest cruise ship in the world.the Royal Carribean "Mariner of the Seas". This is the newest ship in their fleet, on it's twelfth voyage. As we pulled out of Port Canaveral Fl, we passed the YCCC Clipper Ship in real life.the US Coast Guard "Eagle". Our cruise docked in three ports, but with limited time and our first time in Nassau, St Thomas, and St Martin, I didn't want to subject my wife to Ham Radio visits. However, I did try to look up FM5BH on St Martin.only to find that FM is Martinique! Gotta brush up on my countries list.hi



The low bands in ARRL CW were the best I can recall, ever. I should have revisited 160 a few more times, but am thankful I worked the mults I did because Mon morning after the contest I found that the wire had broken on the Inverted L. This

time I rebuilt it with 10Ga insulated wire, and will use No 10 from now on for all wire antennas. I always used 14 ga or 12 ga wire before, thinking that 10 would be too heavy or hard to work with, but it turns out that's not the case. Buying a 500 ft roll at HD the price per foot was almost half what it would have been if they measured what I needed.

I recently met W1VOV in an RV show. Arnie was a Novice when I was, and we used to work each other often in those early days way back when. He was sure he had gotten his ticket in '53, and knowing that he was licensed before I was, he had me wondering if I had given out the wrong check in SS all these years! Coincidentally, I just ran across an old 1953 callbook. My General call was in it, so I'm sure I my check of 52 is correct!

Speaking of Sweepstakes, the club member who placed in Top Ten from New England BEFORE Randy (before Randy was born) was W1JYH. Roger Corey is now W1AX, and placed on top or near the top in DX Contests, CD Parties and sweepstakes in the 40's and 50's.

I just made an interesting discovery of a source of RFI in the house. I was listening to an AM portable radio that we use in the shower, and while tuning it found a loud buzzing around 1500Khz, that I surmised had to be from something in the house. Walking around the house, I could hear it all over, but it peaked right in the shack where I have a little 13 inch TV set. Although the set was turned OFF, it was generating this RFI! Unplugging it cleared it up. I'm sure if I tuned the ham bands I would find frequencies where that set was interfering, and I've yet to check other TV sets in the house. I mentioned this to Ed Hare, W1RFI, and Dave Patton, NN1N and both were aware of similar problems. Dave has a set he unplugs during contests. Am I the only one who hadn't run across this before?

While reading the tail end of a QSO in the car I heard SM2EKM telling someone he had bad key clicks. He was just signing with the other station, and I was wondering who it was and what kind of radio it was, so I called the SM and got an earful about how all FT1000's had clicks, be they MP's or not. The SM had two MP's himself, and had cleaned them up by installing the W8JI mods available on the Internet. I related that noone ever told me I had clicks with my FT1000D (but I was well aware of much discussion about clicks for years on the reflectors.)

Fast forward to ARRL DX CW. Ten is wide open with big signals from Europe, and K5NA calls me to tell me my clicks are wiping him out down 5 khz, off the back of my beam! I moved away (but didn't quit the contest), and after it was over made some checks with N7NG who also has a FT1000D. We concluded we both had clicks that were worse than we would want to put on the bands. I installed the simple W8JI mod which took all of half an hour, a 2N3904, a 1500 ohm resistor, and a ten uf capacitor, and made further checks with Wayne. Wayne reported that it was very clean now (as I had already been told by others on the band), and is making the mod to his rig also.

It's now March 5 as I'm finishing this up, and my Dayton arrangements are finalized. If you havent ordered your admission tickets yet, they can be ordered on-line for the first time this year (Google search Dayton Hamvention). I noticed it IS being called the Dayton Hamvention again, after dropping "Dayton" last year. Looking forward to seeing many of the world's contesters there as usual.

A real highlight of our 47 day RV trip was a visit to TenTec and a tour of the factory with Scott Robbins, W4PA . I really was pleased to see a small American company turning out the great equipment they are building, with about 100 employees. They do it all right there, from stamping the chassis and silkscreening the panels to vibration testing every rig in final checkout and burn in.

On our way East from Az (where we missed the Ham gathering in Quartsite by a week again) we camped overnite in a Rest area outside Las Cruces New Mexico. We usually stay in campgrounds, but this Rest Area was special. It not only has a twenty five foot high Sculptured Road Runner, but the sign along I 10 just before the rest area says "This area maintained by the Las Cruces Chapter of QCWA". For you youngsters.(we have a few). that's "Quarter Century Wireless Association". We awoke the next morning to the beautiful sight of 80 Hot Air balloons over Las Cruces.and I even got to go up in one!

Compact Wire Tri-band Yagi for 10 -20m

2 active elements each band

Specifications

300KHz 2:1 BW on 10-15m; 350KHz on 20m Gain 5.5 dBi F/B \sim 10 dB

6 wire elements – 2 active on each band Single feed point requiring no matching circuits. Only 10 feet wide – makes a good portable antenna.

This is a wire version of a 2 element Yagi antenna using a single feed point, no traps, and no matching circuits. The antenna is based on the open sleeve dipole design employing a single dipole feed at the 20m driven elements. The 10 and 15m driven elements are driven via the 20m dipole. This antenna was designed for W1JQ to use at his contest station and has shown good results. You may build this antenna for your own use and not for commercial resale.

The elements are cut from various sized wires.


Center Frequency, 28.3, 21.2 and 14.175

For CW:

Make 10m DE, 207.75" long, 15m DE, 271.125", 20m is the same length as above

You do not have to adjust the reflectors.

The driven elements use # 8 wires to improve BW and keep losses down.



Open sleeve insulators.

Make up insulators to hold the 2" and 4" separation distances constant. This is an important step that must not be skipped. Use ½" PVC pipe 8" long and drill holes to accept the #8 wires. You will need to place the insulators ever 16 to 24". Use 10 insulators of this style. Cut 4 more 6" insulators and drill for #8 wires to slide over 15 and 20m wires. Space every 16-24". Make up small wire jumpers to wrap around each wire and insulator to keep them in place. Solder each jumper.


Use an isolator at the end of each wire. To the above chart add 2" to each wire length.

Install the end insulators temporarily, i.e., no solder, leaving about 2" of wire to trim.

Frame

Build the out of good quality 2"x2"x10' lengths of wood. You can use other material if you like. Attach the wires and ropes to the frame. Let the wires sag slightly so the ropes will take up the strain. Attach a coaxial cable to the 20m dipole, e.g., RG8X will work well.

You should use a choke or 1:1balun. 6 turns of RG8X in solenoid form around a 4" dia. will work well. Fasten coax to wood frame and leave enough to tune the antenna.



take the load. Tuning

Antenna should be at least 15 or 20 feet above the ground. Tune the 20m DE first and center at 14.175 MHz. SWR should be good. Note how much wire you trimmed off. Trim 20m REF the by the same amount as removed from the DE. Tune 15m next in the same manor. Do 10m elements last. Recheck all band and Tweak if needed. Solder all the wires and make sure that the Dacron ropes are taking the load.

Proposed Budget Amendment Expenditures

Given the increasing size of the club and some of the exciting new programs we are developing, it seems to me that we should institute some financial planning mechanisms for the club. This issue has been on my mind for several years. An appropriate amendment to the club constitution/bylaws will make our lives easier. In the wording I'm suggesting below, there is a requirement for the club officers to think ahead by preparing a budget, an additional requirement for the club membership to approve the budget, and there is reasonable flexibility for the officers to handle things that are unanticipated. The ammendment might read something like this:

XX. EXPENDITURES.

- A. Prior to the first General Meeting following the election of officers, the President shall publish to the membership a proposed line item budget for the year. At the first General Meeting following the election of officers, the Membership shall be required to adopt a budget by a vote of 2/3 majority of the members in attendance.
- B. Expenditures of club funds in accordance with the approved budget, by line item, shall be at the discretion of the President.
- C. Individual expenditures in excess of a budget line item or not contemplated by the budget and not exceeding \$200.00 (Two Hundred Dollars) must be approved by at least three elected officers.
- D. Unanticipated expenditures of more than \$200.00 must additionally be approved by a simple majority of the members present and voting at a regularly scheduled club meeting.

I look forward to discussing this further with the membership at the April 3 meeting!

Subscription - \$** (A "friend of YCCC" - not a member but a possible candidate for future membership. Receives club newsletter only in paper or electronic form. Fee basis is \$20 for overseas paper delivery, \$15 for domestic paper delivery and \$10 for electronic "Ebutt" delivery domestically or overseas.)

Club members who move out of club territory and so are not eligible to contribute to club aggregate scores automatically become subscribers. New members who join at the February meeting are credited with dues for the year beginning the following April. You can tell if you owe dues by checking your 'Butt mailing label.
