It has been a year already; I cannot believe it myself.

We have achieved (at least with claimed scores) a fifth consecutive CQWW Team Championship. This is a major achievement for this Club. It is not something that I can claim responsibility for, but something that you as a Team have done with the leadership of Jeff, K1ZM who lead us to the first one, Don K2KQ who followed up with two more, and Jim K1IR who led us to the fourth. I have only tried to inspire you to get I the chair, on the air, and to submit your score for the club! It is you folks, each of you who did just that to which we owe the honor of the fifth championship should it indeed come our way. And it should.

We are still chasing the ARRL scores and submissions, and the deadline for the SSB logs will be just the week before the April meeting and well after this newsletter is published. As this is being written the CW deadline has not yet arrived either. So I do not know the final tallies. I see our participation is down by a large percentage based on what we have been presented for scores. This concerns me and we will need to discuss this more. But I hope that if this 'Butt gets to you before the SSB log deadline and you haven't submitted your score yet, that you will. The address for email log submissions is dxph@arrl.org and if you need assistance converting to Cabrillo format, please let me know and we can assist you in that area from almost any file format. Participation seemed down a little even for the FRC guys, and conditions were certainly off in ARRL DX SSB but we still need to put our butts in the chair if we are to succeed.

Why was participation down? There are many reasons, and some of them I think we need to look into. The one that we can perhaps do something about is this: I received many mails from folks who chose not to support the YCCC because they felt that we have become a paper club since the meeting requirement was abolished along with the ARRL's removal of the same requirement. We have seen the reduced meeting attendance at all of our meetings this year. While we strived to provide good content at each meeting, attendance was down. While I disagree with the basic statement that we have become a paper club with this change, I cannot ignore the fact that many of our membership (or past membership in some cases now) feel otherwise and have given their scores to other clubs. What do you feel? Let's discuss this in upcoming meetings and on the reflector. Send me a note describing what you think, perhaps on either side of the issue. Let your feelings or thoughts be known. There is such a large core of this club that does get on the air, strives to exceed personally and as a member of the Team, that the "paper" statement seems off center to me. I do wonder however if a requirement for meeting attendance might serve to increase participation, and if it does, that can only be a good thing. I don't suspect it will bring back those who have opted to give their support to other club's but it might serve to improve the membership's participation as we go forward.

This past year we have moved the meetings around some, and that has certainly been well received, it has been good to see some of the faces that we might otherwise not see at meetings. We had meetings in Vernon, CT; Milford, CT, and a special meeting in Groton, CT at the Nautilus Museum. We also have a meeting scheduled for June in Southern NH. Our idea was to make some of the meetings more accessible to the membership, and still maintain meetings in the central location. While we had hoped that some of the NLI folks might have come over on a ferry to the Milford or Groton meetings, both were still attended well. I can't thank everyone who helped organize the meetings enough for their efforts. They were all great.

This coming year it is my hope to see meetings in Way-WMA perhaps Springfield or Pittsfield area, maybe also one favoring the NLI folks in some manner. Please remember that we need to keep the general membership in consideration so we can't fall completely to one edge of a region of the club. I have tried to make as many of the regional meetings as I could, and have traveled to some of the reaches of our territory in doing so. Please consider trying to organize an area meeting in your neck of the woods. If you don't have a regional manager, please let me know and I will try to arrange to be there. All of these regional meetings have served the club well, I would hope that we try to continue with them as much as practical in addition to the core general meetings.

## The YCCC Scuttlebutt — Flotsam & Jetsam

KAIZEN! That's what the Japanese call it. It's time to review what went right and what went wrong in the recent contests, and document what needs improvement. "KAIZEN", Continuous Improvement makes for bigger scores and keeps it all interesting. I sure have a few things on my list after a couple of disastrous experiences this contest season.

It started with the North American Sprint, a couple weeks before ARRL CW. I had downloaded the latest NA software, practiced using it, was all set for my favorite contest when an hour before the start my computer crashed. In a panic, I called Tom, K1KI to see if he had any ideas, and I learned that he was using paper logs for the Sprint. Apparently this is one contest where many feel they can do better with paper than computer logging. I found a couple of old log blanks, ran out to make copies, and used paper logs to turn in my best QSO total ever! In case you aren't aware, the record for the most Qs Single Op, some 11,000, was set by Rich, N6KT with paper logs. Rich always uses paper ...and Trey, N5KO puts it in the computer for him afterwards. In my case...NEVER AGAIN! I spent at least as much time after the contest putting it into a new computer, and editing the times line by line!

At lunch yesterday Jim, W1UK mentioned a recent thread that talked about hams spending more time chasing computer-related problems than hardware problems. That's certainly the case for me. When my Cabrillo submission for ARRL CW bounced, I realized that although I was careful to set the time to the nearest second, the date was wrong in this new computer I had just set up, and I had to edit every one of the 1300 Qs to correct the date! After a bunch of other problems that discouraged a serious effort, I think I finally have this new computer working right. Unfortunately it wasn't until after the contest that I straightened it all out

George, W1EBI, recently had audio problems which he isolated to audio cables being too close to his computer power cable. I don't know if it was just AC hum or not, but I wouldn't be surprised if switching power supply noise was coupled as well. Many computers have inadequate power line filters, which can result in computer QRM from the switchers. As I mentioned previously in this column, the solution for me in my last computer was to install an outboard line filter removed from an old DEC computer or peripheral.

Contesting and Ham radio in general make the world a smaller place. In our RV travels in January, we decided to

visit Quartsite AZ, as it wasn't really out of the way heading from Lake Havasu to Tucson, and I knew there was a big hamfest that gathers there every January. Quartsite is an enormous desert area with literally thousands of RV's camped in the dessert free of charge with no hookups. Not knowing exactly where the hams gathered, I got on 2 meters by hooking my VHF output on the 706 to my HF antenna and asked if anyone could steer me to the area. A station came back and said, "is this the W1WEF I hear in Brewster on the Cape"? This is W1JCD". I had never worked him before, but he monitors 2M and had heard me in his hometown on Cape. He told us where the hams gathered, and when I met Jim on arrival, he immediately reminded me of an old friend, K1MMX who I rarely see except at an occasional hamfest in CT. When Jim introduced himself, I found he had the same last name as K1MMX. Upon telling him that he reminded me of Angelo, Jim told me that he had looked up hams with the same last name, and his mother told him that Angelo's family was related, but they had never met! Small world, isn't it?

#### **10 Years of Contests and QSLs** Randy Thompson, K5ZD

I moved back to Massachusetts in February 1993. My first log entries from the new station were in the ARRL DX Phone contest of that year. I think I was barefoot to a Hygain multi-band vertical strapped on to a chain link fence in the back yard. Station building commenced in May and the station was fully operational by CQ WW in October.

I decided that the move to the new QTH would also be a great time to convert to full computer logging. I purchased DX4WIN and it became the collection point for all QSOs made in and out of contests.

Of course, we all know that if you make lots of contacts, you will receive lots of QSL cards. I see no need to clutter the QSL bureau system with unwanted cards, so I decided I would only answer QSLs. This enabled me to conduct two long-term experiments: study error rates and study what could be achieved just from incoming cards. The tenth year anniversary seems like a suitable event to present some results.

I love contests. I am not much of a DXer, but I will chase the occasional big expedition and make random DX QSOs around the bands. I do operate lots and lots of contests; the major ones such as CQWW, smaller country contests, and even state QSO Parties. The table below lists the QSO totals by band and mode from March 1, 1993 to March 1, 2003.

I didn't really get into RTTY until 1999, but it offered another fun set of contests to play around in. The other column would be a few PSK31 QSOs and some 6 meter activity with a borrowed radio. I just never got interested in the WARC bands because there were no contests there!

99.9% of my QSL cards come in through the W5 QSL Bureau. At one point near the bottom of the sunspot cycle, bureau manager WF5E said I received more cards than anyone else in the bureau! He made me a separate "letter" and shipped cards to me by UPS on a quarterly basis. This still occurs and is a great way to lower the cost.

When a batch of QSLs was received, I would check them against the computer and mark them for printing a label. If a call could be matched with something in the log, I would note the error in the comments field. This was the main goal of my effort – to determine my call copying error rate. If I couldn't find anything close enough to match, I threw the card away. In retrospect, I wish I had kept statistics on these as well. I suspect many of them were people who confused my call with KZ5D.

The results of the QSL error study are presented below. These include both my operation and those of various guest ops. They correspond extremely well with the typical error range of the contest log checking (UBN or LCR) reports. This clearly demonstrates just how good the computerized log checking process has become.

Note: Since I was only looking at incoming cards where the other station had my call correct, the experiment is only measuring a portion of the possible errors. Errors made in the other station's log are not discovered.

Since I was already in a QSL counting mode, I looked at some other interesting statistics from of this process.

Did you know you could get to 5BDXCC if you work enough people and have enough patience? I am only 3 cards short on 80m. My DXCC totals just from cards received are shown below.

Another thing I have always wondered about is how long does it take before you have received all the cards you are going to get? The table below shows the QSOs made and corresponding QSL receipts for each calendar year.

The average QSL rate is steady around 14 to 15%. It drops in 2000 and beyond because there are still incoming cards for this period that have not been received yet. Does this constant represent an approximation of the new participants in contesting each year?

About 5000 to 8000 of the contacts each year were made by guest ops. There are 4000 QSOs made with the YCCC club call AJ1I in WPX CW contests that are also not included.

So where do these cards come from? What countries are the most prolific QSLers? The answers, at least for my log, are below. These 33 countries represents over 87% of the total QSLs received.

Japan and Germany are expected, but Spain and Belgium were surprises. I think Belgium is helped by the 100% contest QSLing of ON4UN under all of his OT\*T calls. Spain and Italy show the QSL rate that a country with lots of new hams can generate.

At the lower end of the list, we see countries that are less affluent or that don't find another USA QSL that compelling.

Now we can determine the cost benefit ratio of preemptive QSLing. On one hand, you print out the labels and the QSL responsibility is dispatched in one shot. On the other, you waste about 85% of your QSLs (i.e., the other guy didn't want one).

Of course, it takes time to check the incoming cards against the log, but I find that a fun way to appreciate each card and to learn more about the kinds of errors I am making.

The numbers above also give a small indication of what the new ARRL Logbook of the World (LOTW) concept is going to provide. We will have access to a much higher level of instant confirmations, but with 1.5 to 2% (or higher!) error rates in the data.

I can't wait to see what the next 10 years will bring!

## YCCC MULTI-OP AWARDS

This is a matter which stems from an ever-increasing migration to my station in VY2 - which, as you know, will no longer allow me to credit my scores to YCCC for ARRL contests. This is troubling to me, of course, because I \*choose\* where I compete these days - and since my focus is increasingly moving "up North" - this decision cuts directly against the grain of my natural loyalties to YCCC - and I have to take cognizance of how this looks to my peers within YCCC.

A related consideration is that, going forward, my station will, most likely, be staffed (and perhaps even be operated exclusively) by operators from other clubs which compete directly with YCCC. Allowing this to occur while ostensibly remaining a member "IN GOOD STANDING" within YCCC is something I cannot do (certainly not with a clear conscience).

In that I was one of the FOUNDERS of YCCC, I cannot reconcile these two positions in any way that makes sense to me and, rather than create situations which might be frowned upon or otherwise questioned by my friends within YCCC, it is simplest for me to consider these moves from a position OUTSIDE the club.

A related matter, of more than some concern to me also, is the fact that I have been intimately involved within YCCC for over 25 years now - and while it may not have been immediately obvious to some members, I have often played a role behind the scenes within the club - and it is time to establish a clean departure from these aspects of my "radio life" as well. I suppose it is like getting pregnant - you either are or you are NOT - and for me, it has always been 1000% dedication - no in-between role and it is time for me now to really "let go" and leave it to others within the club to take it upon themselves to do what they know is right anyway.

Why now? Well, apart from the above mentioned factors the Club now has an OUTSTANDING President in N1XS and it has been my distinct pleasure to work with Chris behind the scenes during the DRIVE FOR FIVE campaign, for example. It was also my honor to lead the club to its first-ever win in CQWW in 1998. I shall be forever grateful to the members of this club who followed me and supported me in that effort - together we learned what it takes to win, how to execute and we proved, once and for all, that we could beat our arch-rivals down in FRC. I hope we never lose the "fire in our bellies" to beat those rascals - time and time again - the Club can of course, but that part is UP TO YOU - the assembled members - and whether you really WANT TO - or instead get tired of winning and just get LAZY - that choice is yours to make - HI. And, even if I am not involved anymore with the club's fortunes on a direct basis, I'll be hoping that YCCC never loses its way again and forgets what it takes to win.....

Having served as the LAST President of the original MM club, it was difficult indeed trying to blaze a new trail to rejoin forces with the old Northeast Contest Club - but what was created out of the two former clubs - eg: the new YCCC - has proven itself to have been worth the effort as we are still around 26 years later - and a realistic possibility of "five in a row" victories over FRC in CQWW surely has a \*\*nice\*\* RING TO IT!

So, gang. I am penning my last as a YCCC member with this email. Let me again thank all those folks who have contributed to this fine club over the years - and even though I'll be "retired" from contest clubs in general, you'll no doubt find me on the bands calling CQ contest for many years to come, God willing.

Hope to CU in the pileups - go YCCC - and here's hoping to many more successes in whatever areas of competition the club may seek to enter in the year's ahead.
