George will be working to give the Challenge a new feel for the coming contest season.

A third area of focus that should help to increase the interaction amongst our members is communication mechanisms. We have several communication tools already in place. All are working well right now, but all can be improved even more.

The Scuttlebutt is the most widely received communication vehicle we use. Every member gets a copy, either by email or by USPS. Steve has lots of experience as a newsletter editor, and I know he'll be bringing a plethora of new ideas to the 'Butt. We have every reason to expect great things in this space!

The YCCC email reflector sees tremendous use every day. It has been an invaluable communication tool for many of our members. I can say, personally, that the reflector has been very important to me. It was the excitement in communications with various members over the reflector that convinced me to pursue the presidency of the club this year. I encourage every member to subscribe to the reflector

Even if you just monitor the activity there, you'll find that you're tapped into everything that's going on in the club. Do you know who makes sure the reflector keeps running without interruptions? But, you do want to know about important club events and major issues that we're dealing with. To accomplish this, we will be creating a special email list that everyone will be subscribed to. Messages going to this list will be carefully managed. Although the volume will be low, it will be very important for you to monitor these messages.

Finally, there's the YCCC website http://www.yccc.org. The club's website has been a tremendous asset for many years hosted, developed and maintained gratis by a group of mostly unsung heroes. Server space and technical support were provided by W4AN's crew [founders of eham.net and contesting.com], including AD1C, K5ZD and KM3T. However, due to changes in our technical and support requirements, we recently decided to make a move in our website hosting arrangement. We have made that change and the site is now hosted on a new server. For those of you with a technical interest, the new server is an NT machine; the old site ran under Unix. This means there are some additional things we can do with the website and we have a good number of skilled web people in the club who are willing to help out in this area. Sometime soon I hope to make an announcement describing just how we'll be handling the website. You should expect to see more visual, interactive and personal elements on the website in the coming months.

All Hands On Deck

When I took the podium for the first time after the elections in April, I noted that our club has clearly been very successful but that we have the potential to achieve much, much more. One of the secrets to unleashing that potential is getting our membership involved. In the past few weeks, I have been very impressed with the number of volunteers who have stepped forward to take on the wide variety of interesting roles that need to be performed. But, there are many more things on our wish list than we have people to do them. If EVERY member on the roster takes on just one small task, we can transform our club into a juggernaut leading the contest community and setting an example for amateur radio clubs of all kinds.

April Meeting Minutes (4/1/2001)

Club President Don, K2KQ, called the meeting to order. He displayed the new YCCC club banners, one podiumsized and the other a large flag. The club emblem is blue with gold accents on a white background, with a white clipper ship. Charlotte, KQ1F, will bring the new banners to Dayton. The artwork will soon be on the club web site in Adobe Illustrator format, so it is scaleable for other uses. Don also had club pins available. The meeting began with introductions of the 49 members present. Mike, K1TWF, is still working on getting the club incorporated. Club Treasurer Ric, KV1W, gave the treasurer's report, which showed a balance of \$7289.35, plus \$160.00 in the CD Fund.

Art, W1RZF, then talked about club and team score breakdowns. For the CQ WW CW, the club had 183 participants for a total of 372M. For the CQ WW SSB, the club had 237 participants, for 302M. He also showed a chart of the top ten percent scorers. Dave, K1HT, then talked about the ARRL DX Contest scores. For CW, the club had 102 entrants, for a score of 199.3M, compared to 121 entrants and 197.5M last year. On SSB, with some data still coming in, the club had 105 entrants and 161.5M, compared to 129 entrants and 208M last year. The ARRL totals this year are 207 entrants for 360.8M, compared to 250 entrants for 405.4M last year claimed, with last year's published totals 253 entrants and 395M. For comparison, FRC's published numbers for last year were 164 entrants for a total score of 322.7M. Dave reminded everyone to send in their WPX SSB scores.

The club welcomed one new member: Frank Welch, N1FUS

Paul, K1XM, then commented on the categories of people who make major contributions to the club aggregate scores: the multi-op station owners and the team of people who drum up eligibility for the club aggregate score: Jeff, K1ZM, Art, W1RZF, Dave, K1HT, and Charlotte, KQ1F.

Don, K2KQ, then held an open question session, similar to the on-the-air meetings. Did anyone have experience with the 756PRO in a contest? Several members said that its receiver is as good as an FT1000D, but that the rig does not have a real dual receiver. The DSP works great. Where does the 756PRO stand out? Its DSP filters are better than analog filters, and it is a good ergonomic radio and very easy to use. Jack, W1WEF, noted that plugging his headphones into the speaker jack instead of the headphone jack on his FT1000s (both D and MP) allowed him to get more drive to the headphones. More discussion of DSP circuits and A/D converters followed. Why isn't anyone using NA contest software? Multiops use CT, and serious single-ops use WriteLog. However, NA has better support for two-radio contesting and is still under active development. Some members use TR, which is also good for two-radio contesting. How much insertion loss can be expected in two-radio contesting using transmitter filters? The consensus was that it should be insignificant, and filters may not even be needed unless all the antennas are on one tower. How bad is it to have multiple independent antennas with separate feed lines on the same boom? Ira, K2RD, has a multi-band quad, which is heavily filtered with stubs on the amplifiers and WX0B filtering on the transmitters. He warns that you also need to put a 2m bandpass filter on your packet rig, and reccommends using double-shielded coax for everything in your shack. Any advice for 2m packet cluster signal getting into the home theater system? Try ferrite chokes and isolation transformers. What should the shack Pentium 133 be replaced with when the budget is around \$500? The new computer needs to run Windows, support WriteLog, and have both a serial and a parallel port. Several ideas were tossed around. Several members report good success using an MFJ equalizer to boost audio for frequencies where their hearing or the radio's receiver is weak and suggest this method for curing "muddy" audio and reducing operator fatigue.

Art, W1RZF, then talked about the W1 QSL BURO. He was happy to report that he now has 28 individuals and 12 clubs signed up to do the presorting and is very pleased with the response. He brought several cartons of cards for presorters as well as several cartons for final sorters.

Don, K2KQ, showed pictures of his favorite station chair. The chair itself is too cumbersome to bring. It is an Aeron chair, made by Herman Miller, and lists for \$699. See their web site at <u>http://www.hermanmiller.com</u>.

For the Show and Tell session, Jack, W1WEF, brought a two-radio switch box he built based on a K8CC design published in NCJ several years ago. Yuri, K3BU, brought his switching box that allows two-radio switching on the same band. During the break, several keyers and paddles were set up on the side table for CW mavens to test-drive, including models from Bencher, Kent, G4ZPY, Schurr, and Vibroplex.

After the break, club elections were held. The following were elected for the 2001-2002 contest year: Treasurer: Ric, KV1W, Secretary: Charlotte, KQ1F, President: Jim, K1IR, Vice President: Len, K1NU, and Activities Manager: JP, W2XX.

Don, K2KQ, then talked about club strategic plans. The club mission should be to turn "newbies" into "old farts" with club support (technical, institutional, and social). He believes that the club should have a couple of remote

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general meetings (not in Worcester). He volunteered to organize a meeting in Bridgeport or New Haven next February, with the focus on Antennas. He reccommends a second site, maybe southern New Hampshire (Nashua?), for the June meeting. He would like to make it mandatory for the area managers to plan one meeting ahead of time and advertise it. He believes that the general meetings should have more content, and that the easiest way to achieve this is to appoint "meeting managers" who report to the Activities Manager, each responsible for the program material at one meeting. Don will organize the FRC-PVRC-YCCC joint picnic in July, which will be on the IOTA Contest weekend as that is the only available date. He wants at least one multi-multi Contest University run this summer, for example, in conjunction with the WAE contest, advertised so that many people will come. He would like to appoint roving area managers who can set up local meetings. The club needs an awards manager. He would like to see the general meetings videotaped so that the program material can be shown at local meetings. And he would like to schedule local and general meetings ahead of time.

Art, W1RZF, then talked about awards. One idea is to have individual awards based on scores or improvement in scores. He is also looking for ideas on how to improve the team challenge. Get your ideas to Art.

Incoming President Jim, K1IR, then talked about ideas to revitalize the club. Then Yuri, K3BU, talked about the Tesla Club Contest he has been working on. Yuri would also like to see an East Coast convention each year in the fall, and is working on that idea.

WRTC-2004: Northeast USA

It you have discussed past WRTCs with anyone who has been involved in running one, they all tell you that it's the best amateur radio experience they have ever had. They will also tell you that it's a huge undertaking, but worth every moment.

If YCCC does WRTC-2004, it will follow in that tradition and add to it in a way that will never be matched.

While we didn't start WRTC, we have the means to sponsor one that will set the standard for the future. After all, we have the experience of three previous events to draw on.

YCCC takes in a territory that offers unique assets, available nowhere else on earth. If we don't take advantage of these and we sponsor an adequate but mundane WRTC, we will be missing an opportunity that occurs once in a lifetime.

If we do it right, we can ingratiate amateur radio in general and YCCC and contesting in particular with effectiveness that can't be matched by any other group.

We take in two major metropolitan areas, the seat of the international community (UN Headquarters) and the New England location every contester is itching to try. We have a wealth of educational and cultural assets, unmatched anywhere else. We have within our territory all the Ivy League colleges but two, plus numerous other major colleges and universities. One of our secondary cities, Worcester, has ten colleges. Coming to our area, even if it were not for WRTC, would be an exciting experience in its own right. Anyone coming to WRTC 2004 should have the opportunity to sample the wealth of attractions we have in our region and want to return.

Within our territory, the electric light and the first electric power company were created. The site of the first transatlantic radio station (Marconi), the first FM broadcast station (Armstrong's W2XMN), the first commercial television stations (RCA's WNBT and DuMont's WABD), many of the first international communications facilities (RCA at Rocky Point and Press Wireless' WPK at Hicksville) were located here. The Beverage antenna was invented here. Phil Carter did the pioneering work on vertical antennas here. The MIT Radiation Laboratory pioneered modern radar and the Cruft Laboratory at Harvard pioneered electronic countermeasures. Much of the early work on ARPANET, which led to the creation of the internet, happened here at Bolt, Beranek and Newman. The modern electronic computer as developed at IBM was born here and the minicomputer as well, at Digital. Those are but a few of the contributions to modern technology that emanated from our territory. In the world of amateur radio, we have the headquarters of both ARRL and IARU. A wide variety of technical innovations within amateur radio originated here. Not too long ago, the 4-square was invented here. Within YCCC, we have the author of the first successful contesting logger, and the creators of packet cluster.

So, YCCC has not only an opportunity, but also a responsibility. Being the best requires an appreciation of that responsibility.

We will need a well-designed plan and an organization to make it happen. Above all, we need an individual to lead who can realize the potential both of the region and the human resources in the region.

The key activity will be fund-raising. With sufficient funds, we can hire professionals to take care of myriad non-radio details. Without enough funds, the job will require a huge amount of volunteer manpower. The unique contributions we can best make are our vision and our talents.

It would truly be a shame if YCCC fell into a provincial funk and failed to share both the work and the glory connected with a really memorable WRTC. Furthermore, it would be a major embarrassment for us all if we accept this task and either fail to follow through or fail to take advantage of all that's available to us. It's up to us.

Flotsam & Jetsam

As a result of an email problem, F&J missed the last three issues of the Butt. There was a lesson learned however, worth passing on. Doug had changed his email address, but when I emailed his old address, I received no notice that it was undeliverable! I should have asked for a return receipt...an option I never used before!

Speaking of email addresses, League members can sign up on the arrl website to use their call @arrl.net as their email address. Any email sent to that address is forwarded to you at the address you provide the League. If you change your email address or ISP, you just notify the League, and you don't have to notify everyone you know. I don't know why we don't all use that free service!

Fred, K1VR sends this tip along: Save the cost of a refrigerator for your shack, or the time necessary to make multiple trips to the kitchen refrigerator. For the contest, pull a picnic cooler out of the garage and put it next to you in the shack. In advance, freeze several plastic milk bottles filled with water as really giant ice cubes. Standard picnic gel blocks are not adequate for 48 hours of cooling.

Having recently purchased a second FT1000D, I was more determined than ever to make use of the second radio. I decided that the easiest way to go was to put up separate wire antennas, far away from my single tower. Thanks to a suggestion from NT1N, I put up vertical dipoles on 20, 15 and 10, suspended from tree limbs. The dipoles worked fairly well, with minimal QRM between radios, thanks to the distance and polarization.I was pleased to find that when I needed 500 ft of RG213 coax for this last minute project, Radioware had it on my doorstep two days later at a very good price! (NX1G @ 800 457 7373)

I recently asked on the YCCC Monday night gathering on 3830 for suggestions where to buy 2 conductor shielded cable no more than 1/8 in diameter. I thought that Don, K2KQ was dreaming when he suggested Home Depot, but to my surprise they had exactly what I wanted! I've bought antenna wire there for years (eg 12 ga THHN stranded), but never stopped to look at all the other cable they carry.

Tom, N1MM suggests that it's a good idea to keep shortcuts to items related to a "task" in a folder on your

desktop; eg put shortcuts to all tools you need for contesting in a Contesting folder. You can put in shortcuts to Geoclock, your logging program, Windows Explorer, shortcuts to different URLs, etc. Don't put shortcuts in just one place. For example, you might want shortcuts to Windows Explorer in each task window.

Jeff Briggs suggested recently that he always uses a relay to open the receive antenna inputs to his radios, and to ground the input while transmitting. This is cheap insurance against blasting the front end with RF picked up on beverages or other receive antennas while transmitting. I built a simple outboard box to do it with a Radio Shack 12V relay...p/n 275-248A.

Paul, K1XM recently mentioned that he was considering using CATV RG6 to save weight on DXpeditions. I thought that was a great idea, and for the heck of it looked at what could be done for connectors. I found that Radio Shack makes an adapter from F to PL259. Screw-on F connectors with RG6 have worked well for me in TV applications.

If you don't already do it, keep a notebook with station notes on everything you do to your station for future reference. I keep a loose leaf notebook with an index by date.I can then remove any pages that are no longer relevant. (I suppose this could be stored in your computer, but not as easily if you have a lot of sketches!)

Does anyone know who currently is holding the call W9IOP? I worked him in 2000 Sweepstakes, and was reminded of the original W9IOP, Larry LeCashman who was one of the most impressive SS operators there ever was. Larry would go back to two people at the same time and tell both to send their exchanges simultaneously.

In a recent QSO with K4XU, Dick mentioned that he was going to "reverse feed" his tower to use it as an antenna on 80. I had never heard of this, but Dick said that K4VX did it and it worked well for Lew. Put 4 elevated radials at the base of the tower, put the center of the coax to the radials, and the shield to the tower! I suspect you can tune it by adjusting radial lengths or using an omega match.
