The summer meetings really seem to have been received well! We had larger turnouts than expected at each one, found some new members and built a bunch of new friendships. I believe YCCC now stands as the largest contest club in the USA. The next step for us is to improve on our #2 finish in CQWW SSB and CW in 1995, and #2 finish in ARRL DX SOB and CW in 1996.

The Frankford Radio Club (big antennas, enthusiastic attitude, Philadelphia area) boasts that they are the best contest club in the country, and they have dominated in the club competition scoring for years. Actually, in CQWW they have won in every year since 1983 - twelve years in a row! So, let's congratulate them for a great effort during one entire sunspot cycle - and beat them this year, and keep it up until the next sunspot minimum.

Last year we were solidly beaten - something like 276m to 218m points. Much of the difference was in the FRC's effort to get every member on the air as much as possible on both modes if possible. They also pushed for DXpedition points and outgunned us there as well. In the end, they usually get more then 75% of their members on the air on each mode, while YCCC's effort only turns out 30-40%. We usually have bigger average scores and more finishers in the Top Ten, but they dominate in submitting single operator assisted (packet) and in multi-operator entries. This is the year we can end their winning streak!

If you make more than 300 QSOs (6-8 hours) on either mode we'll have a great-looking YCCC certificate for you, and if you can reach 600 QSOs (15-20 hours) on

either mode you'll be taking home a rare YCCC mug! Of course, if you have more than an average station and several years of contest experience, you may be able to do much better than that!

Welcome to all of the new members that have joined over the summer, and welcome back to everyone who has renewed their YCCC membership. We really will have to work hard to have a chance of coming in first in the CQWW club competition - but it is within reach for the first time in many years.

Everyone has to contribute for us to windo whatever you can do to maximize your score. The most important ingredient is for you to squeeze in more hours of operating! Operate where your efforts will produce the most points - at home or helping someone else out. Just remember that you can have too many people at a multi-operator station - the total points per operator may suffer. If YCCC is to win this year, it will be because we all made a contribution, not because of a few big scorers. See you in the pileups!

1996-1997 Contest Propagation Predictions

Cientists believe that Cycle 23 has already started and that the solar flux Should start rising within a year or so. The bad news is that solar activity will still be low for the CQWW and the ARRL DX contests this fall and winter. Sorry, folks. I am still using an optimistic value of Smoothed Sunspot Number = 15 for this season's propagation tables.

Again, this year's tables list predicted signal strengths by S-units. One new feature: signals stronger than S9 are listed as S9+. I have divided the world up into seven geographic areas, as follows:

EU = Europe; zones 14, 15, 16, 20 and 40

FE = Far East; zones 19, 24, 25, 26 and 28

SA = Central/South America/Caribbean; zones 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13

AF = Africa; zones 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 38 and 39

AS = Central and South Asia; zones 17, 18, 21, 22 and 23

OC = Oceania; zones 27, 29, 30, 31 and 32

NA = North America; zones 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6.

As usual, the predictions were done using IONCAP, and they assume undisturbed geomagnetic conditions. The antennas used at each end of all circuits represent typical good-sized contest stations: 100-foot high dipoles on 80 and 40 meters, a 3-element Yagi at 100 feet on 20 meters, and 4-element Yagis at 60 feet for 15 and 10 meters. Scale the results accordingly for different types of antennas. For example, if a DX station transmits with a dipole on the higher bands instead of with a Yagi, subtract 2 S-units from the values in the table. I have assumed that a typical receiver's S-Meter is generous, with 4 dB per Sunit. The transmitter power at each end of the circuit is 1500 W.

Observations:

Just like last year, conditions on 10 meters will not be a lot of fun, but do watch out for those weak-signal openings into Oceania late in the afternoon. There will be some nice multipliers there, but the pileups will probably be horrendous, just as they will be for the Africans coming through about 18 UTC.

15 meters will be very important for multipliers. The European runs will still not be as hot and heavy as they have been in the last few years, nor will they last as long. If you are running Europeans, you should occasionally ask them to stand by for any Asian stations that might be in the pileup.

Expect 20 meters to be the workhorse band, as it has for the last couple of years. Look for Far East stations during the morning European runs, and in the afternoon. Signal levels will be moderate (a peak of S8 is predicted for the CQWW SSB), but there should be JAs available. In the middle of your 40meter CW runs, don't forget to catch the 20-meter Southeast Asia opening about 22-23 UTC.

40 meters will be lots of fun at this point in the solar cycle. IONCAP predicts that signals, albeit very weak, will be available 24 hours a day on 40 meters. Work your brains out into Europe! Turn your beam to catch long-path Southeast Asians just about sunset too.

80 meters will be 80 meters -- sunspots essentially don't matter on this band. Work all the Europeans you can to get lots of multipliers. The signals from the western Africans will be S9 for much of the evening, while the deep south Africans will only be about S4, about 01-03 UTC. If you're going to get a JA, it will be about 09-10 UTC, but they'll be weak as usual.

Note that the column "NA" (North America) includes all zones in North America. This means that the signals will be very loud on the lower bands, dominated in these computations by signals from Zone 5, of course. On 80 meters you may be able to snag a zone 1 KL7 around 10 UTC, and zone 3 will peak about 09 UTC. □

his month we are inaugurating a new column that will **I** present odds and ends worth passing along that might help the newcomer or oldtimer alike. We all do things routinely that we may think are widely known, but that's not necessarily so. Whether it's a source for hardware, a way to do the job easier, a contest operating tip...Flotsam & Jetsam is where you can share your useful tips with fellow YCCCers. Please don't feel that they have to be original... many of us have missed good ideas because we didn't read everything that was ever published! Here are a few to kick it off:

- Rohn tower sections go together much easier when both the mating ends are given a good dose of WD-40.
- Rusty spots on galvanized towers can be touched up with a spray can of Cold Galvanizing after light wire brushing.
- Loctite Rust Reformer inhibits further rusting. Just apply to rusty areas...turns black but can be painted over.
- Separating Rohn sections...use a small scissors jack between two boards placed between the sections. Tie the boards and jack to the tower so you dont have to catch them when the sections separate
- Clean up aluminum antenna elements with fine steel wool. Wear gloves.
- Home Depot carries a product called "GB Ox-gard", an antioxidant compound for aluminum joints good for coating mating antenna elements. A \$3 tube ensures ease of seperation should the antenna ever be taken apart, and one tube is enough for two TH6's.

Romeo Wins the Big One: KCDXC Carp Tournament

Despite much controversary, Romeo, 3W3RR, out fished the field in the annual KCDXC Carp Tournament on July 26 and brought in a 21 pound certified American Carp.

Romeo was proclaimed the winner of the Tournament by Head Judge N0XA, despite claims from numerous participants that he wasn't on the Kaw River in Kansas, but was really across the boundary line in Missouri. Romeo claims he was fishing in the mouth of the Kaw River, just before it becomes the Missouri. He explained, "Whose [sic] to say just where the boundary line is on a river anyway?"

Even though several Dxers from W1 land claimed they saw Romeo anchor his boat just inside the Kansas line and throw his bait (1 stick of dynamite) back over into Missouri waters, his victory became official.

Know Your Wetlands!

YCCC CLUB RESOURCE INFORMATION

DUES AND MEMBERSHIP STUFF Dues (currently \$20) are payable as of the April election meeting, which begins our club "contest year", with a grace period until the end of June, at which time your membership lapses if dues are not paid up. In order to rejoin, a lapsed member must attend a meeting, like any new member, or may simply become a subscriber to the Scuttlebutt by paying up (see below). Club members who move out of club territory and so are not eligible to contribute to club aggregate scores automatically become subscribers. New members who join at the February meeting are credited with dues for the year beginning the following April. You can tell if you owe dues by checking your 'Butt mailing label. Only paid-up members are eligible to contribute to the club score in contests. Mail your dues to the club secretary, Charlotte Richardson, KQ1F, 11 Michigan Dr., Hudson, MA 01749. FAMILY MEMBERS Members of the same family living at the same address may elect to receive only one copy of the Scuttlebutt. One member of the family must pay full dues, enabling the rest of the family to join as family members, which is free. STUDENT MEMBERS Full-time students are eligible for dues at half the regular rate. SCUTTLEBUTT SUBSCRIPTIONS Anyone may subscribe to the club newsletter, the Scuttlebutt. The subscription year begins in April. Subscribers who sign up between December and April are considered paid-up for the upcoming year. You can tell if your subscription is current by checking your 'Butt mailing label. The grace period for late subscriptions is the same as for late memberships.
