For the diehard contesters, the next meeting will include a fishing contest. This is no joke, read on...

The contest period will be 11AM to 3PM, local time. Single operator only,

one rod/reel at a time. "No nets, no pets, no multi-hook lines. No explosives".

#### Scoring:

Count one point per fish caught, regardless of size. Multiplier is number of species caught.

#### Prizes

First and second prizes will be Swift 660/F spinning reels. These are usable for fishing, or for installing antennas in trees.

#### Disqualification

The decision of the awards committee is final, unless you threaten to sue, and even then they are very stubborn.

Alan, N2KW, the contest sponsor will bring extra rods and reels. If you have fishing gear, you are encouraged to bring it.

#### Secretary's Report Yankee Clipper Contest Club

The June, 1991, YCCC meeting was held at the Sturbridge Host Hotel (the former Sheraton Sturbridge), in Sturbridge, Massachusetts, on June 2nd. 57 members and their guests attended. The meeting, chaired by new club president Stu, KC1F, began with introductions. The treasurer's report, which was not read, showed a balance of \$2739.33. The club welcomed 4 new and returning members:

Ed, NT2X, gave an update on 3W3RR. The QSL cards have been printed, and the first batch mailed from Sophia. Ed showed a sample one. The XZ DXpedition was delayed in submitting documentation to the ARRL, but the information was to be FAXed soon. Ed also warned that 3W3RR and 1S0XV QSL cards have been appearing in Europe which were not for real QSOs. The individual responsible has been identified and will not have anything further to do with Romeo's QSLing chores.

Stu, KC1F, passed on a DXAC update from Joe, W1JR. The 9 to 6 recommendation that the Penguin Islands be added to the DXCC list was accepted, and cards for Penguin Islands may be submitted on 1 September 1991. North Korea is approved but has had not operation so has not been added as a country.

The DX Contest Quiz, given by Stu, KC1F, winner of last year's quiz, was won by Jeff, K1ZM, with 68 points, making Jeff responsible for next year's Quiz.

During the commercial break, several members had various items for sale. Carl, KM1H, of Radiokit, offered ferrite beads for \$2 (with half of the price to be donated to the club and the packet network) and silver-plated Teflon PL259 connectors for \$1. At the end of the meeting, Carl presented a total contribution of \$78, which was divided evenly between the club treasury and the packet system.

Paul, NX1P, offered a logging program using Microsoft Windows called LogView, for \$85. John, KB1T, offered Contest Calendars for \$5. Don, W3AZD, had DXCC lists.

After the break, Carl, KM1H, and Fred, K2TR, showed slides of their stations and antenna systems, and described their installations. The YCCC Contest Scramble was won by Charles, KD2SX.

Then Rich, K2WR, discussed meeting dates for next year, resulting in a decision to try to schedule some Saturday and some Sunday meetings, as the Club has done in the past, although this may increase the cost of the meeting room slightly.

The date for the August picnic will be set soon.

Ken, K1EA, then gave an update on the latest version of CT, version 7. It includes several new features, including the CQ 160 contest, the ARRL 160 contest, the ARRL 10m contest, Field Day, and a DXpedition mode. Ken has recoded CT from C to C++, making addition of new features easier. He plans to add the All Asia contest and the IARU contest (Radiosport), although probably not in time for this year's contests. He has added a automatic QSL mode, including offby-one callsign handling. He has installed a landline bulletin board for CT bugs, new version, etc. He made bug fixes to the VHF contest. Ken also discussed the status of the packet network. Of the money raised last fall for the packet network, most went to installing 9600 baud modems, radios, TNCs, and new nodes. Two new 9600 baud links connect K1EA and KB1H and KB1H and W1RM for improved service.

After the meeting, many members adjourned to Rom's.

#### Friday April 26

Parking was \$3.50 this year - sort of a bonehead amount. The attendants were heard muttering "Them quarters is heavy!!". A bit of rain in the morning, but it cleared up by noon and the weather stayed FB for the duration. I did the flea market mostly, and found 7 of the 18 issues of QST I need to complete my collection. This is a major find. And if you know anyone with issues from 1916-1920, call me immediately!

Some guy was selling things called "Static Busters". These things supposedly were designed for airplane applications and consist of a threaded end and about a 4 inch long body ending in a whole bunch of teenyweeny strands of wire all fanned out. It's strange stuff - tape that isn't sticky on either side, but if you wrap it around a cable or connector, it will fuse to itself over a short time. \$2 a roll, \$1.75 for 20 or more rolls. Minimum order 10 rolls. I'll let you know if it really works.

Saw some of the indoors stuff as well. Yaesu has a new transceiver, the FT-990, otherwise known as "FT-1000 Lite". It features the same unusable computer interface so CT won't drive it correctly, and it's still in the \$2000-2500 class as I recall. K7JA says he's complained to the boys in Tokyo about the interface, but no satisfaction yet. Drake is apparently trying to get back into the radio business (guess Satellite TV is over), and they have a new receiver called the R-8, but I didn't see it.

The World Radio Sport Federation seems to be gaining momentum (you should contact W2GD for details), and the Goodwill Games video is excellent (send \$25 to K7SS for a copy - it's worth it). I missed the PJ9W talk, but people told me it was outrageous - these OH guys spent a huge amount of money building a huge super multi-multi for the CQWW last year. And they're going this year, too. Rumor has it that they will have a 4-element rotary on 80 and 3 element rotary on 160.

After the contest forum, I wandered around inside again. Heath had a small booth - they are discontinuing most of their ham gear and had several notebooks indicating what inventory

It's an 18-day tour including a cruise up a Siberian river on a boat complete with ham station on board. If I had known about it earlier, I might have considered going. It sounds like a gas. Contact N2AA.

Dinner Saturday was held at the Myung Sung Japanese-Chinese-Korean Restaurant, with W3-Bravo-Golf-November as the Master of Ceremonies. This has emerged as a traditional contesters' dinner. A map to the restaurant appears elsewhere, so you'll know how to get there next year. Sat at a table with W2GD, K1AR, K1ZX, W0UN, K5ZD, W1WEF, K1TO, K1CC, and W6RGG. It got pretty silly. Some of the lines I scribbled down:

It was W6RGG's first trip to Dayton he claims there weren't any airplanes in the old days. He also claims to hold an unlisted FOC number. AI6V dropped by later, and 'RGG fed him a few table scraps.

N6TR has a new logging program. No packet support. I don't remember if it controls the radio. And it costs more than CT. Sorry, Tree. That problem is solved already.

He has one very cute feature - a name database. You can use the program for routine operating and add names as you work guys. Then when they call you in a contest, it automatically inserts "Hi (name)" in the cw exchange. Nice touch. He also added a hack that selects a random name for certain selected guys. That's why I get called Vlad or Toshi when I work N6TR.

After dinner, we all converged on Stouffer's. The KCDXC suite was the place to be. The traditional KCDXC pileup tape contest created quite a bit of controversy this year. It seems that some of the headphones had no response at normal listening frequencies, leading to some famous contesters placing very poorly. I gave the guys a hard time, and they responded that it's only for fun anyway. I believe they are missing the point, and should do a better job next year. A little effort should improve things substantially.

A bunch of guys converged in the Stouffer's lobby around 11 PM to sing "Happy Birthday" to Samuel F.B. Morse, who would have been 200. Turns out that the PVRC guys got together a proclamation from the U.S. Government recognizing ole Sam's birthday. W3LPL said the hardest part was convincing Congressmen that there was no hidden agenda behind it, and nobody was going to profit from the proclamation. W6CF was handing out "Happy Birthday Sam" buttons to anyone who promised to wear them.

At about 3 AM, 'AR once again got the munchies. We called around for pizza, and only found one place in Dayton open (most places close at 2). Anyway, they delivered a genuinely awful pizza at about 3:30, which was devoured in the now-legendary "Lobby Suite".

#### Sunday April 28

Fairly low-key day. Flight home was at 2 PM, so we had plenty of time to stroll one more time through the flea market and the exhibits. While walking around with K5ZD, we decided that there is a "theme" to Dayton every year among the "thirtysomething" contest crowd. A few years ago, it was buying a house and building a station. The next year we all had kids, and had to find time for radio somehow. Then we all got into packet and CT, so traditional rig and antenna discussions evolved into talk of nodes, disk capacity, CPU clock rates, bugs, and country file anomalies. And the prevailing topic this year seemed to be how busy we all are at work.

At the appointed hour, we climbed into the mother of all rental cars and headed for the airport with F6EXV/7O8AA. Paul's a very interesting fellow - he works selling wooden barrels to age wine. Very French, and a far cry from the typical W1 computer jock.

At the airport, we ran into Tree, N6TR, and had lunch with him at the same table where he ate lunch with F2CW last year. See - it ISN'T always the same guys! We also bumped into OH2BH at the airport. Last summer in Seattle, 'AR and I ran into Martti at the airport also. When we mentioned this to him, he responded "I'm ALWAYS at the airport!". Can't argue with that.

## CONTEST SOFTWARE PACKAGE SPECIAL OFFER!

For the past 2 years at the KY1H multi-multi contest station we have been using a computer logging system... So what you say??? Well, this is a bit different.. I have software for before, during and after contests. We plan strategies using a propagation program, log during the contest, then analyze results afterwards using this set of programs. Why not just use CT?? Well for one thing we log on 6 bands at once using just one computer. The logging program is called MM and I wrote it specifically for multi-multi contesting. I started with help from K1EA because I hate to re-invent the wheel and I wanted to keep the log file compatible with CT. I think that this program, and some of the other tools we use are ready for wider use. For those of you who are happy doing single station contests you may be interested in some of the before and after the contest tools I have to help plan for contests and analyze the results.

In addition to the basic logging program I will send you the MMPRINT program. This program prints logs, and does all the breakdowns that CT does, and much more. I have created 10 more breakdowns of QSO rates with outputs that can either be printed or imported into programs like Mathcad, Lotus 123, SuperCalc, and other plotting programs for interesting graphs. The breakdowns I supply include QSO rates by: the DX station's sunrise, local noon, sunset, beam heading, and a world map of what bands are open to

where. These breakdowns can also be done with CT created log files.

Not enough?? Well then add this new program!

I will throw in a contest planning aid. How often have you heard of a strange band opening that you never suspected was there? Don't know when to QSY from 20 to 15 to 10 meters in the morning?? Well here is a bit of help for all you that have gone through contesting just feeling your way around the bands. This program uses the MINIMUF-85 algorithm to provide a world wide MUF plot showing band openings on 20,15, and 10 meters. It also plots the LUF using a different algorithm showing openings on 40, 80, and 160 meters. This also provides sunrise and set lines plus great circle projections from your QTH. I am working on comparing this program's results with actual contest data so that I can continue to improve it, but even now it has proved to be an interesting aid in planning contest strategy.

How much would you pay now??? But wait, there's more!

My version of the QSL label printing program is also included. This uses CT or MM log files to print card labels. It keeps a database so that you only send one QSL per band to each station you work... once a station gets a QSL for each band they never get one again. This has cut my QSL load by about 50% so far. The advantage of my version of this program is that it will handle an almost unlimited database, the only limit is the size of the new log being added. My database is over 21K calls now and growing... The program works so well I haven't even re-written it to use expanded memory, and I can still process a 5KQSO log.

And as an extra bonus!

Also in the package I have a program that only works on MM created logs that lets you track operator performance. This program takes a special MM log file and gives you a

breakdown that includes: operator call, time on band, qso rate, number of scheds made, dx spots received, and dx spots sent.

Now, why would anyone want to use MM instead of CT???

- 1. MM only requires one computer for up to 16 stations (8 if you use it to send CW)... True, you have to buy special multi-port comm port cards, but they are cheaper than whole computers.
- 2. MM provides 26 programmable CW messages, each available with a single keystroke. I use the Morse Machine to generate CW, so you still have full use of all of its functions including the ability to stop a message by touching the paddles.
- 3. MM has a special display format tailored to M/M contest needs. This display includes upcoming scheds, sorted and filtered dx spots, interstation and packet chat, propagation predictions, local and DX sunrise and set, beam headings, and other band frequencies. And this is all available continuously at all operating positions.
- 4. How about a quadruple backup of log. Every QSO is written to the hard disk twice, printed immediately, then the log is copied to floppy every hour.
- 5. I support remote spotter inputs and queries via the Packet Cluster. Using this program a remote spotter can query your log to know what you need then send you a 'private' DX spot. Outside operators can also use the Cluster talk function to talk directly to each band operator.
- 6. MM has been well tested on CQWW DX, ARRL DX, WPX, and CQ 160 contests... I know you can't do M/M in CQ 160 contest, but I like that one and hate to change programs for one contest. It will also handle the ARRL 10m and 160m contests, but needs a bit more cleanup to be nice for them.

Why not to use MM.

- It doesn't do Sweepstakes or handle WAE QTC's.. at least not yet.
- It doesn't talk to radios.. I have enrolled in a course in Japanese for next year.
- 3. It doesn't do pretty colors and windows or use a variety of function keys, alt-keys, and other keyboard functions. (Or should this be in the reasons to use MM section???)
- 4. While it will run on an older PC or XT I highly recommend an 80286 or better computer. You should also have 1 Meg of expanded memory available to use all the features, otherwise log space is a bit limited.
- 5. Editing of log is not real pretty, but then again you can just load the log into CT and edit it after a contest.

All this plus my updated country files (CT compatible of course), free support (I definitely want more user inputs), and manuals for owners and operators for the low, low price of \$20!!! Proceeds will be donated to the YCCC Packet Fund.

#### The Place to Find Club Information

DUES are due at the April election meeting, which begins our club "contest year", with a grace period until the end of June. Membership in the club will lapse at the end of the grace period if dues are not paid up. In order to re-join the club, a lapsed member must attend a meeting, like any new member, and be welcomed back into membership, or may become a subscriber to the Scuttlebutt by paying up (see below). Club members who move out of club territory and so are not eligible to contribute to club aggregate scores automatically become subscribers. New members who join at the last meeting of the club's contest year (February) are credited with dues for the following year (that is, the contest year beginning that April). You can tell if you owe dues by checking your Butt mailing label. Only paid-up members are eligible to contribute to the the club score in contests.

FAMILY MEMBER Members of the same family living at the same address may elect to receive only one copy of the Butt. One member of the family must pay full dues, enabling the rest of the family to join as family members. Being a family member is currently free.

STUDENT MEMBERS Full-time students are eligible for dues at half the regular rate.

SCUTTLEBUTT SUBSCRIBERS Anyone may subscribe to the club newsletter, the Scuttlebutt. A subscription currently costs \$10 per year. At the present time, overseas subscriptions cost the same as domestic (we have very few overseas subscribers). The subscription period begins at the beginning of the club year, in April. New subscribers who begin their subscriptions after the December issue are considered to have paid for the following year (that is, they receive as many issues as new members joining at that time do). You can tell if your subscription is current by checking your Butt mailing label. The grace period for late subscriptions is the same as for late memberships
