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## Captain's Cabin Fred Lass, K2TR

The YCCC annual family picnic will be held on Saturday, August 6, 1988, starting at 11 AM. Bring your own cooler full of food and drink. Modest grill space provided. Families welcome. Swimming available. Holland Pond State Park, off of route 20 west of Sturbridge. Details below.

"There's a little black spot on the sun today." So goes the song by the rock group "The Police". Those black spots are bringing us outstanding propagation. Conditions are destined to be superb this fall. The same sun will likely be shining on our picnic on Saturday. So fill up the cooler – pack the car and don't forget your HT. I can't wait. See you there.

Those freckles on the face of the sun mean that we must prepare our stations for this year's contests. That high 15 meter antenna will still be useful on some openings, but heights between 50' and 100' are likely to have the highest European rates. On 10 meters optimum heights change from day to day. I remember the 10 meter contest in 1979, the peak of the last cycle. On Saturday my best antenna was a stack of three element beams at 35' and 75'. On Sunday a 4 element at 170' had the best rates. No matter which antenna you have I'm reminded of the advice given by a FRC members years ago: "If 10 is wide-open Saturday, fill those log pages with 10 meter QSOs – there's no guarantee that Sunday will be as good."

Our hard-working editor, Paul, K1XM, is in need of articles to continue the tradition of this exceptional newsletter. I enjoyed reading K1ZM's saga to Puerto Rico. The dedication to contesting in spite of overwhelming obstacles that comes through in Jeff's true story is an inspiration to those of us with more simple obstructions such as TVI, family obligations, etc. Next time that things don't go quite right, compare your problem to Jeff's. It's likely to be a small stumbling block. A block that can be moved or worked around some way with less determination than Jeff needed to win that contest. To me, the contest didn't seem quite as exciting as the trip.

Individually, and as a club, our determination to win has always shown. The same tactics that have won us one gavel need to be repeated this year. The scores will be astronomical due to sunspots. The club needs each and every one of you to score higher than ever before. Just winning by a little is no longer our destiny. I want to win by so much that the competition stops trying to win!

## Next Meeting Paul Young, K1XM

The next meeting of the Yankee Clipper Contest Club will be the annual club family picnic on Saturday, August 6, 1988, at Holland Pond State Park, in Holland, Massachusetts, about ten minutes' drive west of the usual club meeting place in Sturbridge. The picnic

begins at 11, although you may want to arrive when the park opens at 10 to help Bob, KA1XN, and Bill, N1CQ, reserve our picnic tables. The park has softball and frisbee fields, a shaded picnic area, and a swimming beach on a lake complete with changing rooms and lifeguards, so bring along the whole family. The club will bring at least one barbecue grill; feel free to bring hibachis, lawn chairs, etc. There will be a brief business meeting at 1 pm to welcome new members and handle any other necessary club business.

To get to the picnic, proceed as if you were going to our usual meeting place at the Sheraton Sturbridge by taking the Mass. Turnpike to the I-84 exit and going south one exit on I-84 to the Sturbridge exit. From there, take route 20 west through Sturbridge, passing the Sheraton along the way. Note: even if you are coming from the west on the Turnpike, it is quicker to get off at the Sturbridge exit and go west on route 20 than to exit at the Palmer exit. Between Sturbridge and Brimfield, route 20 crosses a bridge over a lake. After crossing the water, you will note a big brown park sign on the left. Turn left at the sign saying "Holland 4 miles". Follow this road for about 3 miles, and then follow the park signs by turning right on Dug Hill Road opposite the town sand pit on the left. To enter the park, turn right at the stockade fence and sign for the recreation area. This will bring you to the main gate and parking area. The park charges \$3 per carload for parking.

If you are coming from the west along route 20, you will see a Holland Pond State Park sign indicating where to turn right, then follow the directions above.

## Secretary's Report Yankee Clipper Contest Club

The June YCCC meeting was held at the Sheraton Sturbridge on 5 June 1988 with 44 members, their families, and many guests in attendance. Club President Fred, K2TR, proudly called the meeting to order with the club's new ARRL gavel. The suggestion was made to allow Past-President Bill, KM1C, to keep the gavel at his station for the coming contest year and bring it to meetings, in recognition of his hard work as President during the past years and his contribution to the winning of the gavel. The gavel was passed around while the members and visitors introduced themselves. The club then welcomed three new members:

The Treasurer's Report showed a treasury balance of \$862.55, with postage contributions from the advertisers in the last two Scuttlebutts yet to be received. Plans began for the August barbecue meeting. Members preferred that the meeting be at a state park or at the QTH of Fred, K2TR, rather than at the Sheraton, as in past years. It was also noted that the October meeting is at the New England Division ARRL Convention at Boxboro. There was no old business. Fred, K2TR, then presented his "state of the club" speech, and discussed packet network loading and explained how each member should support the local packet BBS operator.

Bill, N1CQ, then presented the afternoon's program.

Dave, KY1H, talked about tower and antenna construction safety, and passed out handouts on rope specifications and diagrams of the stresses on the ropes while raising antennas. He also discussed new improvements to the packet network.

During the break, Carl, KM1H, of Radiokit, offered ferrite superbeads for sale to members for \$2 instead of the regular \$3, with \$1 of each sale going to the club treasury (this netted \$65 for the club; the beads were very popular).

After the break, Eric Von Valtier, of Detroit, MI, spoke about his programmable keyer, called the TH-1 Compu-Keyer. Eric, a builder of industrial computers for automation in Detroit who has recently rediscovered his early interest in amateur radio and expects to become relicensed this summer, explained that the name of the device stands for "Third Hand". It is a complete keying, logging, and dupe checking system, with CMOS battery-backed memory (like an industrial process computer) which will hold about 10,000 QSOs when the full complement of memory is installed (2500 QSOs if only one chip is installed). The system provides instantaneous dupe checking (per band or for the whole log) by parameters set at the beginning of the contest, and can also do prefix checking. It has external communications ports so that it can be attached to a PC and/or to a printer, which can be set up to print out the log in real time as the QSOs are made. The Compukeyer will sell for \$350, plus \$40 for a small separate box to mute your receiver output and supply a sidetone for offline data entry of the exchange while the built-in keyer is sending your QRZ. For phone contest, a keyboard can be attached. The keyer uses an Intel 8051 chip. PC software to interface to the keyer and to manipulate the log data is also available. Eric brought several of these machines for interested members to try out in the back of the room. The 50/50 raffle brought \$24 to Carl, WG2E.

Following the raffle, Bill, N1CQ, Fred, K2TR, and John, W1RR, held an antenna forum, answering questions from the members. The discussion centered around verticals and ground systems for them, W2PV design Yagis and stacked Yagis, and plans for cheap antenna systems.

After the meeting adjourned, hungry members descended on Rom's and other local eateries for much-needed refreshment!

## Single-Op Plus Packet John Dorr, K1AR

I've always admired the "hard-core" single-op contester - you know, the type that has entered every CQWW since 1947 and took 4 hours offtime once during the '53 event for the birth of their first child. Operating as a single operator has always been a category that peaked my interest in contesting. There were a variety of reasons, but they all seemed to center on the intense competition and satisfaction in winning a few.

Until recently, I thought there was no other operating class worth considering; that is until I discovered Packet Radio. In reality, I stumbled into the packet spotting game. There was that one CQWW in 1986 when things really weren't going well - a dreadful feeling for a single operator. Somehow, it's hard to convince yourself that the pain you are experiencing with poor conditions is being equally shared by your competition. So, into packet I jumped with both feet. There was that queasy feeling at first as I fired up the TNC (that's terminal node controller to the casual observer) and my screen came alive. After all, it runs against the grain of a single operator to use "outside assistance" when competing. Something inside kept warning me to expect a member of the CQWW Contest Committee to spring out from behind the couch saying "we got you 'AR!" After about five minutes, however, I discovered something - I was beginning to have fun again. So much fun, in fact, that I haven't entered a log in the single operator category since the 1986 ARRL SSB DX Contest.

What follows is an analysis of the 1987 ARRL SSB DX Contest in which I operated as a Single-Operator + Packet from K1GQ. Prior to the contest, I made several strategic operating decisions:

- Ignore the 10-minute Multi-Single rule
- Announce as many multipliers as possible for other users
- Target my score to be competitive with some of the smaller multi-operator efforts
- Focus the operation on a very high multiplier count

I found it difficult to quantify the "what-if" scenario for determining the incremental increase to my score with and without packet radio spotting. My best guess is as follows:

In describing my experience, I found the benefits from external spotting started immediately at the beginning of the contest. My first spotted multiplier was an S-2 PJ0B on backscatter at 0002Z. What followed was a long list of interesting catches that wound their way into the log as I ran, ran, and ran some more. For example (in the first hour or two):

What I have found is that Packet Spotting allows a station to run more often without the fear of losing multipliers in the process; the best of both worlds for a contester. The real skill is in your ability to hold a frequency (such as a band edge) while running around working spotted multipliers.

In addition to the obvious advantage of working spotted multipliers, there is a highly leverageable technique I began using during the contest. Even when I was operating as a single operator, passing multipliers was key to my strategy. However, nothing improves a score better than passing a multiplier to another band that was spotted by someone else!! In my log, I counted 14 multipliers that I moved to another band immediately after receiving the spotting information and working the station (of course I "re-spotted" the station on his new frequency, hi). Combine that with 50+ incremental multipliers from packet and the usual passing activity and it becomes immediately clear how you can get a high multiplier.

Packet spotting means a lot of band changing as your VFO dial flies across the bands. For example, I changed bands 211 times over 43 hours of operating (5 times per hour on the average). On one log page alone I had 19 band changes (35% of total QSOs on that page) and another with 17 switches. While exhilarating, that style of operating can really wear you out over the course of 48 hours.

In addition to all of the fun, this mode of operating opens up some interesting ethical questions. For example, you enter into your system:

- "Hey guys, I have the band edge on 20M into JA. I want to take a 5 minute break...can someone hold my frequency until I get back??"
- "K1AR...BV2A just called me...come work it and move him to another band off my frequency"
- "Did anyone get the power of that TR8 on 20M??"

never admit to any of the above...even at Dayton), but it makes you think a little, doesn't it?

Based on the growing popularity of packet radio spotting, I think it has gone beyond being simply a fad. AK1A informs me there are over 20 PacketCluster systems installed around the U.S., supporting virtually every major contest club. Until now, I haven't taken a stand on the issue of new operating categories for single-operators + packet. Furthermore, as a contest administrator myself (CQWW Contest Committee), the thought of another category is not very appealing on the surface. What I have discovered with packet spotting is there are new opportunities for guys like me with "smaller" stations to develop significant scores (obviously, the K1GQ example in this article doesn't fit into that argument). While this mode of operating is fun for what it is, I would support a new operating class to enhance both packet radio itself and the payback for those choosing to participate. Simply put, does it really make sense for K1AR to compete against W3LPL in the final standings?

Finally, there are those inevitable collection of stories one acquires over a contest weekend. I think I was in more pileups battling it out with 8 other S9+30 W1's than any other demographic combination. However, there were at least 4 or 5 times I can remember when we joined forces with a rare multiplier and "passed it around the horn" at the expense of our counterparts to the South and West, hi. Packet Radio for me is simply a fun way to operate. of course, there is nothing that will beat 300+ hours at NP4A, but this is the closest I've come recently. While K1AR may return to the single operator ranks one of these days, this is my choice of operating for the moment.

# THE CLUB RESOURCES PAGE THE Place to Find Club Information

DUES are due at the April election meeting, which begins our club "contest year", with a grace period until the end of June. Membership in the club will lapse at the end of the grace period if dues are not paid up. In order to re-join the club, a lapsed member must attend a meeting, like any new member, and be welcomed back into membership, or may become a subscriber to the Scuttlebutt by paying up (see below). Club members who move out of club territory and so are not eligible to contribute to club aggregate scores automatically become subscribers. New members who join at the last meeting of the club's contest year (February) are credited with dues for the following year (that is, the contest year beginning that April). You can tell if you owe dues by checking your Butt mailing label. Only paid-up members are eligible to contribute to the the club score in contests.

FAMILY MEMBERS Members of the same family living at the same address may elect to receive only one copy of the Butt. One member of the family must pay full dues, enabling the rest of the family to join as family members. Being a family member is currently free.

STUDENT MEMBERS Full-time students are eligible for dues at half the regular rate.

SCUTTLEBUTT SUBSCRIBERS Anyone may subscribe to the club newsletter, the Scuttlebutt. A subscription currently costs \$10 per year. At the present time, overseas subscriptions cost the same as domestic (we have very few overseas subscribers). The subscription period begins at the beginning of the club year, in April. New subscribers who begin their subscriptions after the December issue are considered to have paid for the following year (that is, they receive as many issues as new members joining at that time do). You can tell if your subscription is current by checking your Butt mailing label. The grace period for late subscriptions is the same as for late memberships.
