the level of operating proficiency of all our members through mutual exchange of ideas and expertise. If this club is to survive and prosper, this responsibility will have to be recognized and accepted by those of us in a position to be able to fill the role. Personally, I will always try to make it my business to get to meet and talk with our newer and younger members at meetings -- simply to let them know that there is a place for them in this club and that we're glad they came out to a meeting to look us over. In this way, hopefully, they will find someone or something to identify with and will want to join up and submit scores to the club aggregate. I would hope that all of us would also attempt to welcome those newcomers who will join in the future so that the club can continue to renew itself and grow stronger.

With regard to the upcoming fall contest season, a few words need to be said. During the CQ/WW and ARRL SS contests we will have our first real chance to flex our muscles and really establish ourselves as a major contest club. in this country. I sincerely hope each of you will pitch in and support the club in these events by getting on and making points, and then, and this is the most important part, be sure to send in the log with YCCC on it for credit to our club score. How successful we may eventually become on a National scale is anybody's guess at this point. Whether or not this club becomes a powerhouse or whether it withers away and dies on the vine will largely be determined by the . efforts made by YOU--each and every individual member.Remember, every score however small is welcome. The only score that is truly worthless is a big fat zero. In any event, win, lose or draw, we can have a good time just playing the game we all seem to love the best and watch our club's fortunes go up or down based upon our own individual efforts and abilities. The key here is for each of us to establish our own individual goal and then aim for it. By doing this, you'll not only increase your own operating abilities but you'll be contributing to the total team effort as well, and maybe someday we'll win a CQ or ARRL club gavel in the process. Meetings

Our constitution and ARRL require that we hold at least <u>four</u> OFFICIAL meetings each year. We have adopted the four official meetings a year approach, rather than six or eight, to make it as simple as possible for those members residing 50 miles or more outside our club center to retain their eligibility to submit scores to the club aggregate. ARRL requires that those members living from 50-175 miles away from the club center attend at least two (2) of the FOUR

official meetings each year in order to remain eligible to submit scores for the club in ARRL sponsored contests. This then means, for example, that all our members living in Maine, Vermont, New York, New Jersey, as well as most from New Hampshire and even a goodly number from Connecticut and Massachusetts must make it to two OFFICIAL meetings a year to retain their club eligibility in ARRL events.

While it's crucial to remember this rule and plan accordingly, having to travel to attend meetings twice a year should not be an unreasonable requirement for anyone genuinely interested in being a part of the club, in my opinion.

This rule, however, and our proposed method of meeting its requirements does present us with a rather serious problem. If our members were only to get to see each other four times a year, and perhaps at Field Day or at the New England Convention or at Dayton, then one of our primary goals of having everyone get to know each other might be impaired. We simply would not be seeing each other often enough.

In order to solve this problem, we will therefore, also hold unofficial social meetings as well, at which no official club business will be transacted. These gatherings will be held at members' homes and will serve to fill the gap

between the four OFFICIAL meetings.

Since our next official meeting is scheduled for sometime in early October, we will ... probably hold at least two social gatherings between now and then. Anyone wishing to come out to join in on the fellowship is encouraged to do so, but please remember, it is not a requirement to do so in order to retain ARRL score eligibility. These gatherings will simply be to have a good time and to get to know some of your fellow members better. The date of our first gathering is Saturday evening, June 4th, at the home of Roger, W4SYL, in West Concord, Mass. It will start at:7:00PM and run for at least 3-4 hours. We'll have some refreshments that we'll be passing the hat so to speak to pay for and we'll probably be sending out for pizza at some point, for those who want it. There will be a YCCC HOSPITALITY SUITE to formally announce the existence of our new club as the new force in the EAST to the contest world. So, if you can make the trip out, be sure to stop by and join in on meeting some of the top notch contesters who'll be there.

QSL CARDS

Charlie, K1XX, has been hard at work at getting an official YCCC QSL card designed. We're almost done and here's the scoop on the design: It will be printed on a very light blue background with a gold clipper ship emblem. Call letters will be printed in GOLD ink and QSO information on the bottom will be black ink.

The cost is expected to be in the \$15-16 range per thousand cards and members must order their cards in multiples of 1000. The printer says we'll need an initial order of 30,000 cards in total. Thereafter, orders by the club must total at least 8000 cards or in even

4000 card multiples greater than 8000 (IE: 12,000, 16,000, 20,000 etc.).

In order that we may move ahead with this, please call Charlie at 603 899-5621(HOME) or at 603 878-1441(WORK) and tentatively place your individual order. DO NOT SEND BUCKS AT THIS TIME. When we are sure that we'll have enough interest at least for the initial order of the 30,000 cards, we'll ask you to forward your money either to Charlie or the printer or whatever. So, QRX for the final details on just when and where to send your money. We'll announce it in the newsletter in plenty of time for everybody who's interested in getting cards to not miss out. So, for now, just tell Charlie how many cards you'll need. GOT IT??

CQ/WW CONTEST COMMITTEE LIASON APPOINTED

We now have a member who will serve as our link to the CQ/WW contest committee from YCCC. John Yodis, K2VV, from Amsterdam, N.Y., has been recommended to the chairman Bob Cox, K3EST. Bob and I had a pleasant chat last week and he wished us luck with our new club.

John is well qualified for this spot and asked to be appointed to the job. Through John we'll have a conduit to both receive and pass our thoughts to the CQ/WW Committee which

is certainly good for the club.

Bob has already passed the following rules changes along to John for the 1977 upcoming CQ/WW DX CONTESTS. We may even scoop QST on this one, and perhaps CQ magazine as well!!!

1) Stations operating portable outside their own call area must now sign portable in CQ

contests. This is the same as the ARRL rule announced earlier this year.

2) Use of a repeater or spotting net, telephone call tipoff net or any other type of multiplier assistance net in future CQ contests will place the entry into the multi operator category, either multi single or multi multi as determined by the number of operators or transmitters in use etc. This was a much needed rule, in my opinion, and one that I personally waged a two year effort with the CQ Committee about. I'm glad to see they had the wisdom to put it into effect. No longer can an operator claim single operator and use a spotting net in CQ contests, and that is the way ARRL looks at the matter as well.

3) Dupe sheets will be required from now on, but only on those bands on which you make 200 gso's or more. If you make only 25 gso's on 160M, for example, a dupe sheet will

not be required.

CQ/WW RULES CHANGES(cont'd)

4) Duplicate contacts found in CQ logs will cost you a penalty of three additional qso's as well as the dupe. There is also something about a percentage of dupes or total score reduction above which you will be disqualified. Bob says that for the first year and for the first year only, the committee is considering sending youralletter telling you you had too many dupes. You would then have two weeks time to get a clean log into the committee and avoid disqualification. Sounds like a novel approach, so as not to burn that many people, at least for the first year.

Many thanks for the info Bob and John-- and be sure to keep the club up to date on what is going on at CQ John.

ASSISTANT DIRECTOR--ARRL NEW ENGLAND DIVISION


